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Explanations

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1. Which symbol denotes a Platoon on standard map symbology?

- A. A rectangle
- B. A rectangle with three dots above**
- C. A rectangle with an X inside
- D. A rectangle with a vertical line above

In standard map symbology, you identify a unit by a basic frame plus small marks that indicate its echelon. The rectangle is the common frame for a unit, and the marks above it tell you the specific level. Three dots above the rectangle are the symbol used to denote a platoon. This setup makes the platoon stand out clearly from other echelons, which use different marks or arrangements. A plain rectangle lacks the distinguishing marks, so it wouldn't reliably indicate platoon. A rectangle with an X inside or a vertical line above signals other unit types or echelons, not a platoon.

Understanding how unit size is shown on map symbols matters. The base rectangle represents the unit type, and what sits above that symbol signals the echelon or size. A single vertical line above the rectangle is the marker used to denote a company-sized unit, so this symbol clearly identifies a company rather than a platoon, battalion, or higher unit. The other shapes convey different meanings: three dots above would indicate a different size or echelon, a rectangle with an X inside points to another unit category, and a diamond shape is not used for a standard company marker.

3. In the EXAM 2 communication PACE plan, what does 'A' stand for?

In a PACE plan, the letters map to four modes of communication: Primary is the best available method, Alternate is a different medium used if the primary fails, Contingency covers another backup, and Emergency is for immediate signaling if all else fails. The "A" stands for Alternate, the secondary path you switch to when the primary FM (UHF/SINGARS) isn't usable. Using satellite-based communications (JCR/BFT) as the alternate gives a different transmission path and broader reach, bypassing the issues that can affect ground-based radios such as terrain, congestion, or jamming. This redundancy is precisely why satellite is the preferred alternate in many EXAM 2 scenarios. The other options describe non-primary comms or non-communication means (night-ops lighting, emergency pyro), which aren't the alternate path in this plan.

4. Which option correctly identifies the Battalion Echelon Amplifier?

Amplification at each echelon scales with unit size and the area it must cover. A battalion operates over a broader area and handles traffic from multiple companies, so its communications backbone needs a power- and capacity-rated amplifier that can sustain multiple links, route traffic, and maintain signal quality across the battalion's area. The Battalion Echelon Amplifier is designed for that level, providing the necessary reach and capacity to support command-and-control across the battalion and to interface with higher echelons as needed. Smaller echelons—squad or section—don't require or provide enough bandwidth and coverage for a battalion's network, and a company-level amplifier handles only the company's own traffic. So, the amplifier labeled for the battalion echelon is the correct one.

5. Which of the following is a primary risk at FARPs that requires strict control?

In FARPs, the most serious risk is the fire and explosion potential from handling aviation fuel in close proximity to weapons and aircraft. Fuel spills, leaks, or improper fueling procedures can ignite, and with munitions nearby the consequences can be catastrophic, so strict control of fueling operations is essential. This requires grounded and bonded fueling to prevent static discharge, designated fueling areas away from explosives, immediate spill containment and cleanup, readily available fire suppression, and trained personnel following clear procedures. While weather delays, administrative paperwork, and security measures are important, they do not pose the same immediate, high-consequence safety threat as fuel-related fires in a temporary, high-tempo environment.

6. What is the purpose of a FRAGO?

A FRAGO is a Fragmentary Order used to rapidly modify an existing operation order in the field. Its purpose is to convey changes to the current plan—such as new tasks, altered sequencing, or updated coordinating instructions—without rewriting the entire OPOD. This keeps units aligned with the latest intent when conditions on the ground shift, intelligence updates arrive, or resources change. Because it focuses on specific changes, it's treated as a last-minute update rather than a full reissue, ensuring fast communication and minimal disruption to the overall plan.

7. Which risk level requires the highest level of approval?

The level of approval should rise with the potential impact and likelihood of harm. When risk is extremely high, the consequences of a decision going wrong can be severe, so it demands the most senior, formal oversight to ensure all risk controls are in place, alternatives are considered, and proper safeguards are documented. This level of scrutiny helps prevent costly or dangerous outcomes and ensures accountability through top-level sign-off and, often, additional checks or independent review. In contrast, lower risk levels require progressively less stringent oversight, so they can be approved at lower levels with faster decision-making. Extremely high risk therefore requires the highest level of approval.

8. Which symbol represents Aviation (Rotary Wing)?

In this symbol system, each type of unit or capability has its own distinctive marker. Aviation, specifically rotary-wing aircraft, uses a symbol that includes a rotor element to indicate helicopter capability. That rotor-disc style marker quickly identifies air assets on a map or overlay, setting it apart from other branches. So the symbol that carries the aviation (rotary wing) designation is the one designed for aviation rotary wing, not the symbols used for field artillery, engineers, or cavalry. Field artillery has a cannon motif, engineers use tools, and cavalry uses a horse or saber motif, so they wouldn't represent aviation.

Terrain masking uses the lay of the land to hide from detection by blocking the path between a radar and its target. When a hill, ridge, or other terrain feature sits between the radar and the object, the energy that would normally bounce back to the radar is blocked, absorbed, or deflected away. This reduces the amount of energy returned to the radar, making the target appear weaker or invisible on the radar screen. In short, natural terrain disrupts the radar's line of sight and the return signal, lowering detectability. Terrain does affect radio energy and can influence other sensors too, not just radar, and it doesn't inherently boost signal strength.

10. Which statement correctly matches risk acceptance class with its description?

Risk acceptance classifications describe the level of residual risk allowed after protective measures. Four classes map to the severity levels Catastrophic, Critical, Moderate, and Negligible. The statement that Class C corresponds to Moderate is the correct one, placing this class in the middle where risk is noticeable and requires controls or cautious acceptance, but not as severe as Catastrophic or Critical, and not as small as Negligible. The other mappings would assign the higher-severity categories to different classes or place the lowest risk in a higher class, which is why they don't fit.
