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Explanations

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1. When language is naturally acquired, for example babies and toddlers, there is not direct instruction; this is known as what?

Natural language development happens through language acquisition, the subconscious process by which people pick up language from real use and exposure, without explicit teaching. In babies and toddlers, listening to and interacting with caregivers allows them to absorb sounds, patterns, and vocabulary and eventually form grammar rules on their own. This contrasts with language learning, which involves conscious study of rules and forms. Interlanguage describes the learner's evolving, in-progress system as they study a second language, not the natural, uninstructional process. Likewise, "factors that affect how a student learns" refer to influences on learning, not the acquisition process itself. So the best fit for natural, instruction-free language development is language acquisition.

Motivation in language learning is what keeps students engaged and willing to put in the effort over time. When a teacher makes lessons feel relevant and connects topics to a student's interests, learning becomes meaningful rather than just drill. That sense of relevance boosts intrinsic interest and shows a real purpose for studying the language, which increases participation, willingness to take risks with new forms, and consistent practice. For example, tying activities to a student's hobbies, goals, or real-life needs—like using song lyrics they enjoy, planning a trip, or researching topics the student cares about—gives the language a practical use. This connection to personal interests helps students see why they're learning, not just how to memorize forms, which naturally enhances motivation and, in turn, learning outcomes. The other options describe elements that aren't about keeping learners engaged through personal relevance. A student's first-language background can influence how they approach learning, but it doesn't explain the effect of making lessons feel personally meaningful. Language transfer refers to applying rules from the first language to the new one, and overgeneralization is about applying linguistic rules too broadly; neither explains why tying content to interests increases effort and persistence.

3. In Spanish, which sentence uses qué as an interrogative pronoun rather than as a relative pronoun?

Qué used as an interrogative pronoun asks directly for information about identity or choice. In the sentence ¿Qué libro te gusta más?, the word qué stands in for “what” and is asking which book the speaker prefers, with libro serving as the noun being identified. This is a direct question about a specific item, so qué functions as an interrogative pronoun. In the other sentences, qué or que serve different roles. El libro que leí es interesante uses que as a relative pronoun to introduce a clause that describes el libro, connecting it to leí. Le pregunté que sí uses que as a conjunction meaning “that,” introducing content of what was asked, not asking a question about a noun. No sé qué hacer presents qué in an indirect question after saber—the content of the unknown action—again not a direct request about a noun, and it’s the interrogative word functioning inside a subordinate clause rather than introducing a direct interrogative. The key clue is the accent and position: unaccented qué in relative or conjunction functions shows up in the other sentences, while the direct interrogative use with qué signaling “what” occurs in the direct question.

This question is testing your ability to recall information from memory. Recalling previously learned facts, lists, terms, dates, and timelines is all about remembering something you’ve studied and can reproduce without having to analyze or apply it. That’s why this category is named Knowledge: it focuses on memory and retrieval of factual information. For example, being able to list the dates of key events or recite the steps in a process shows this kind recall. Other categories involve higher-level thinking: making connections between ideas, understanding how concepts relate, or comparing items to identify similarities and differences. Those require more than just remembering; they involve interpreting, organizing, or evaluating information.

The preterite is used for actions that were completed in the past at a definite time. It marks a clear end or a single, specific event, often with a time reference: for example, “Ayer cené a las ocho,” or “El año pasado viajé a México.” It’s also common in sequences of completed actions: “Llegué, comí, me fui.” In contrast, ongoing past actions, habitual past actions, and past descriptions use the imperfect. Ongoing actions describe something in progress in the past: “Cuando era niño, vivía en Madrid.” Habitual actions happen repeatedly without a defined end: “Solía ir al parque cada domingo.” Descriptions in the past set the scene or give background: “La casa era grande y tenía un jardín.”

The se passive shows an action done to the subject without naming who did it. It uses se followed by a verb in the third person singular or plural, and the thing acted upon comes after the verb. In Se escribió el libro, se+escribió shows that the action of writing was performed on the book, with no agent specified. This exactly embodies the se passive pattern, yielding the meaning "The book was written." The other sentences rely on a different passive form or awkwardly mix an agent after the se construction, which isn't the standard se-passive usage. Hence, this sentence is the best example of the se passive.

When analyzing a short text for author's purpose and tone, the crucial step is to identify the main claim and then inspect how the text is built to push that claim forward. Finding the thesis shows what the writer wants you to think or do, and then examining vocabulary and sentence structure reveals how they shape that message—whether they aim to persuade, inform, or entertain, and what level of formality or urgency they use. Locating evidence and rhetoric is the next key move. Look at the supports the author uses, the kinds of appeals (logic, emotion, credibility), and any rhetorical devices (repetition, questions, contrast). These elements show not just what the author is arguing, but how they feel about the subject and how they want the reader to respond. All of these cues—word choice, syntax, and rhetorical strategy—together illuminate the tone, whether it's confident, skeptical, hopeful, critical, or ironic. Some approaches miss the mark because they skip straight to surface details or rely on instinct without grounding in the text. Skimming or trusting gut feeling can miss subtle signals; focusing only on font or layout ignores meaning; inferring purpose from the topic alone ignores the actual evidence and how the author uses language to build a particular stance. By anchoring your analysis in the main claim and then tracing how language, structure, and rhetoric support it, you get a clear understanding of both purpose and tone.

Listening and verbal information align with the way an auditory learner takes in material. Auditory learners grasp ideas best when they can hear explanations, lectures, discussions, and verbal repetition. They often remember information more easily after hearing it spoken or recited aloud, rather than reading it or handling it hands-on. In contrast, visual learners prefer images and diagrams, kinesthetic learners need movement and physical manipulation, and reading/writing learners rely on text. So the option that corresponds to listening and verbal input is the auditory style.

La idea clave es que cuando un término se difunde globalmente por la industria, la tecnología y la cultura, tiende a integrarse en muchas lenguas tal como está para mantener claridad y coherencia internacional. En español, palabras como marketing y wifi se usan tal como aparecen en inglés porque describen prácticas y tecnologías que se han desparrramado por todo el mundo. Aunque existen equivalentes en español (por ejemplo, mercadotecnia para marketing; red inalámbrica para wifi), la forma internacional se emplea con frecuencia porque ya es reconocida en negocios, medios y tecnología a nivel global. Además, no es porque no existan traducciones; tampoco porque diccionarios impongan la forma inglesa. Y aunque a veces sí se adaptan ligeramente a la pronunciación o escritura española, lo principal es la difusión mundial que favorece el uso de la forma original para evitar confusiones y mantener la conexión con el uso internacional.

Using a range of media and activities to match different learner styles is characteristic of FLES (Foreign Language in Elementary School). FLES emphasizes developmentally appropriate, multisensory instruction—videos, songs, manipulatives, hands-on activities, games, and online tasks—to help young learners engage with a new language in varied, meaningful ways. This approach targets visual, auditory, and kinesthetic learners by providing multiple avenues for practice and comprehension. The other options focus on students' background factors or on assessments rather than on the instructional methods used, so they don't fit the described approach as well.
