A tracking device under Louisiana Revised Statutes 14:323 is defined as any device that reveals its location through electronic signals. Thus, the definition captures the essence of tracking devices comprehensively, guiding those concerned with legal compliance in investigations.

Such stipulations would not align with the straightforward approach established by the consent of one party, which is foundational in Louisiana's law regarding telephonic and electronic communications.
