9. Which of the following succinctly presents a logical structure to support a claim?

- D. Cannot Be True

The correct answer is "Premise/Conclusion." In a logical structure that supports a claim, premises provide the reasons or evidence for the claim being made, while the conclusion is the claim itself that is being supported by those premises. This structure is essential in constructing a valid argument where the conclusion logically follows from the premises presented. Therefore, the Premise/Conclusion format is crucial in presenting a coherent and logically sound argument.

10. According to the statements, when does P sing seventh?

- A. When G sings fourth
- B. Only if G sings fourth**
- C. When G does not sing fourth
- D. No correlation with G's position

In order for P to sing seventh, the statement specifies that G must sing fourth. This creates a direct correlation between G singing fourth and P singing seventh. Therefore, the correct answer is option B: Only if G sings fourth. This choice captures the essential condition that must be met for P to sing seventh based on the given statements.
