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Explanations

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1. Passage Point is a designated place where passing units pass through what?

- A. The stationary unit**
- B. The moving unit
- C. The enemy
- D. The supply line

A passage point is a designated spot where a moving unit passes through a stationary, fixed unit. The stationary unit stays in place to provide security, control the route, and protect the maneuver as the column advances. You don't pass through the enemy or through a supply line—the passage is specifically through a friendly unit that remains fixed to guide and protect the movement.

2. Which movement method is typically used to maintain overwatch while moving?

Maintaining overwatch while moving centers on keeping security and observation as you advance. The method that does this by design is traveling overwatch: one element moves toward the objective while another element takes a vantage point to observe and respond to threats. This preserves momentum while still providing a ready watch, so you can detect and react to contact quickly without the slower, full bounding pace. This approach is ideal when the terrain is uncertain but not fully hostile, allowing you to move fast yet stay protected. Traveling would reduce explicit overwatch during movement, increasing exposure. Bounding Overwatch, while offering continuous overwatch, slows movement because two teams must alternate, which is better for higher risk or more complex terrain. Linkup refers to bringing units together rather than a method of movement to maintain overwatch.

In military planning, an attack is an offensive action intended to seize, destroy, or compel the enemy to withdraw. A spoiling attack is designed to disrupt the enemy's preparations and seize the initiative before they can mass forces. A counterattack is launched in response to an enemy attack with the aim of regaining the initiative and terrain. An ambush is an attack launched from concealment to surprise and defeat the enemy quickly. Fortified Defense, however, describes a defensive posture built to hold positions and deter or repel advances. It focuses on preventing enemy action rather than initiating it. So, it is not an attack.

The sequence follows how a breach is actually carried out from outside to inside. You start by designating the Breach Area—the exact spot on the obstacle where the breach will be made. Next comes the Reduction Area, because you must prepare and size the obstacle so the breach can occur properly. After the obstacle is prepared, the Point of Breach is reached—the actual opening is created. Once the breach exists, you pass through it at the Point of Penetration. Finally, you reach the Far side Objective beyond the obstacle. This order ensures the obstacle is prepared before you attempt to pass through and that you advance to the target beyond in a logical, step-by-step flow.

Linkup is the operation where two forces come together to operate as one. The way these forces arrive at the rendezvous determines the two standard types: both forces moving toward the meeting point, or one force moving to join with a force that is already in position (stationary) at the rendezvous. This distinction matters for timing, security, and synchronization, since coordinating two moving forces requires different patrol routes and tempo than coordinating a moving force with a stationary element waiting at the linkup point. The other described options don't reflect how doctrine classifies linkups, which is why the two-type breakdown—moving with moving and moving with stationary—is correct.

Protection is planned in its own annex because safeguarding the force and the mission is a distinct responsibility that requires its own integrated measures. The Protection annex details how to safeguard personnel, facilities, information, and critical assets, and it includes security procedures, safety protocols, OPSEC, and force protection measures. It coordinates with other parts of the plan to apply risk mitigation during both planning and execution, ensuring protective actions are implemented consistently. Other annexes cover different functional areas like execution, intelligence, or sustainment, so they don't centralize protection tasks the way the Protection annex does.

The main idea here is how screening criteria judge how well an idea fits with the commander's guidance. Among the standard criteria—suitability, feasibility, acceptability, and distinguishability—suitability specifically asks whether a concept fits the problem and aligns with the commander's concept and intent. It tests coherence with the higher guidance, ensuring the proposed approach advances the desired ends and operates within the commander's concept of operations. If a concept technically works but doesn't align with the overall intent or concept, it isn't suitable. Feasibility looks at whether it can be executed with available resources and within constraints; acceptability considers risk, cost, and stakeholder acceptance; distinguishability checks whether it is clearly different from other options.

Fragments disperse mainly in the downrange direction from the impact area because the blast and debris carry the fragments forward along the path of the explosion. The area that sits downrange from the impact point will therefore have the highest concentration of fragments. Lateral options like the left edge or left flank aren't the primary dispersion axis, and the upstream side is opposite the blast direction. So describing Area B as containing fragments on the downrange side aligns with how debris travels, while Area A would relate to fragments at the far edge or periphery.

Movement through terrain is evaluated by how it affects tempo and risk. Unrestricted terrain means you can move without any hindrance or added delay—it does not slow you down or constrain routes. The option that states movement is free from any restriction matches this meaning exactly. The other descriptions describe terrain that slows or blocks movement or provides cover, which introduces delays or tactical considerations not present in unrestricted terrain. In practice, unrestricted terrain allows standard movement rates and straightforward navigation, which is why that option is correct.

The action described highlights how the Assault Force enables the next wave of operations by ensuring a clear, defined path for follow-on forces to exploit the success. After the objective is reduced, the Assault Force must think beyond seizure and focus on continuity—setting up and marking routes from the reduction area to the battle handover line so follow-on units can move quickly, understand the terrain, and assume control without delay. This handover seamlessness preserves tempo, reduces confusion, and allows exploitation to begin efficiently. While seizing the far side objective is a primary task of the assault, and reducing protective obstacles is critical, those are not the actions that directly facilitate a smooth transition to follow-on forces. Conducting the battle handover is part of the process, but the specific role emphasized here is providing clear routes to the handover line so follow-on units know exactly where to go and how to advance.
