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Explanations

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1. What is a coordinate plane?

- A. A plane formed by perpendicular x- and z-axes used to plot points.
- B. A plane formed by perpendicular x- and y-axes used to plot points.**

A coordinate plane is the two-dimensional surface created by two perpendicular axes—the horizontal x-axis and the vertical y-axis. Their intersection is the origin, and points are plotted using ordered pairs (x, y): move x units along the x-axis from the origin, then y units along the y-axis from there. This setup describes flat space, so it can display all pairs of numbers in two dimensions. If you had a third axis, the z-axis, you'd be in three-dimensional space instead. The other descriptions refer to three-dimensional space or to a line, not a coordinate plane.

The main idea is whether the federal government can enforce its laws, including tax laws, when challenged. The Whiskey Rebellion fits precisely: in 1794, farmers in western Pennsylvania rose up against a whiskey tax and turned violent. Washington answered by calling in federal troops to suppress the rebellion, proving that the Constitution allows the national government to levy taxes and use force if necessary to ensure those laws are obeyed. This set a clear precedent that the federal government has the authority to enforce its laws across states, not just through persuasion or state action. The other options don't reflect a tax-enforcement event: the act that established the federal court system reorganized the judiciary, the Proclamation of Neutrality concerned foreign policy, and Domestic Affairs refers to general matters rather than a specific event.

Volume is about how much space a three-dimensional object occupies. It measures the amount of space inside the object, like how much water would fill it. For a rectangular prism, you multiply length $\times$ width $\times$ height to find the volume, so a box that is 2 by 3 by 4 units holds 24 cubic units of space. Units are cubic (like cubic centimeters or liters) because you're counting in three dimensions. The other ideas mix up different concepts: the area of a surface describes size in two dimensions, not inside space. The distance around a shape is its perimeter, which is about the boundary, not the inner space. The space inside a two-dimensional object would be called area, since a flat shape has no thickness.

4. What is the mean of a data set?

The mean is the arithmetic average of a data set. You add up all the values and then divide by how many values there are. This gives a single representative value that reflects every data point. For example, with values 2, 4, and 6, the sum is 12 and there are 3 values, so the mean is $12 \div 3 = 4$. The mean uses every number in the set, so unusually small or large values can pull it toward them. Other options describe different measures: the median is the middle value when the data are ordered; the range is the difference between the largest and smallest values; the mode is the value that occurs most often. These are distinct ways to describe center or spread.

A proportion is a relationship in which two ratios are equal. The statement that two ratios are equal describes a proportion. For example, $3/4 = 6/8$ is a proportion because both sides express the same value. The other descriptions describe different ideas: a single ratio or fraction, a ratio in general without asserting equality to another ratio, or a rate relationship like $\text{speed} = \text{distance}/\text{time}$, which is not about two ratios being equal. Recognizing that a proportion specifically means two ratios that are equal helps you spot these problems quickly.

6. Which conflict involved Madison ordering the invasion of Canada to gain respect from Britain and expand the United States?

The situation described fits the War of 1812. President James Madison believed that pushing into Canada would force Britain to respect American rights and could also bring territory into the United States, showing Britain that the young nation was willing to take military action to defend its standing. In practice, the U.S. did launch invasions into British-held Canada as part of that conflict, driven by hopes of both national honor and possible expansion, even though those efforts had limited lasting territorial gains. The other events listed aren't wars or invasions into Canada: the Louisiana Purchase was a territorial deal with France, the Embargo Act was an economic measure restricting trade, and the XYZ Affair was a diplomatic incident with France.

Nativism is the stance that protects the interests of native-born inhabitants against those of immigrants. It describes a belief that people born in the country deserve priority in jobs, culture, and political influence, often accompanied by calls to restrict immigration or limit newcomers' rights. This term directly captures the idea of favoring natives over immigrants. The other options describe a person (immigrant), a historical network aiding enslaved people (Underground Railroad), or a transportation feature (canals), none of which express a belief or policy about natives versus immigrants.

8. Which act repealed the Missouri Compromise and allowed the new states of Kansas and Nebraska to choose whether or not to allow slavery?

The key idea is popular sovereignty—letting the people in a territory decide for themselves whether slavery would be legal there. The Missouri Compromise (1820) drew a line forbidding slavery north of 36°30' in newly organized territories. When the Kansas-Nebraska Act was passed, it changed the rule for those two territories by allowing residents to vote on slavery. This effectively overturned the old ban for Kansas and Nebraska, since slavery could be legal if the settlers chose it. That change helped drive fierce conflict known as Bleeding Kansas as pro-slavery and anti-slavery factions moved to influence the outcome. The other options don't fit: the Ostend Manifesto aimed to annex Cuba; the Abolition Movement is a broader effort not a specific repeal; the Dred Scott Decision was a Supreme Court ruling, not the law creating Kansas and Nebraska or deciding their slavery status.

9. What law established the federal court system and empowered the judiciary?

The question is about how the federal court system was created and given authority. After the Constitution was ratified, it set up a national judiciary in broad terms, but the specific structure and powers came from legislation. The Judiciary Act of 1789 established the three levels of federal courts—district courts for trials, circuit courts for appeals, and the Supreme Court—and defined their jurisdictions and duties. This act provided the functional framework that empowered the judiciary to interpret and enforce federal law, making the federal court system work. The other options refer to policies or events unrelated to building the court system.

A map scale shows how a measurement on the map translates into real-world distance. It's a ratio or statement that connects map units to actual units—like 1 inch on the map equals 1 mile in reality, or a ratio such as 1:24,000 means 1 unit on the map represents 24,000 units in the real world. This lets you convert map measurements to real distances, and some maps also show a scale bar to visualize this conversion. The other ideas describe perimeter (distance around a shape), volume (the space inside a 3D object), or the total length of sides of a polygon, which aren't about linking map measurements to real sizes. So the correct concept is the ratio that relates a measurement on the map to the actual size in the real world.
