To determine the stopping distance of a vehicle traveling at 40 mph under ideal conditions, we must consider both the reaction distance and the braking distance. The stopping distance consists of two components: the distance traveled during the driver's reaction time (which is around one second) and the distance it takes for the vehicle to come to a complete stop once the brakes are applied. At 40 mph, the vehicle travels approximately 58 feet in one second.
