Lastly, suggesting that booster seats are only recommended for children under 12 does not capture the full scope of guidelines, as transition from booster seats should be based more on height and safety compliance rather than an arbitrary age limit.

In contrast, speeding up, honking the horn, or continuing to drive disregards the safety of the pedestrian and could lead to dangerous situations. These alternative actions do not comply with traffic laws surrounding pedestrian crosswalks and can increase the risk of an accident.
