Executive Privilege pertains to the right of the executive branch to withhold information from other branches, Impeachment is a process for removing officials from office for misconduct, and Legislative Authority relates to the powers given to legislative bodies to create laws. Each of these serves distinct functions within the government structure but does not address the judiciary's role in reviewing the constitutionality of laws.
