Choosing New Adjustment Layer doesn't create a solid color fill layer but rather starts an adjustment process, which is fundamentally different. Similarly, right-clicking may present layer options but does not directly offer the straightforward path to create a solid color fill in the specified manner. Thus, the selected method provides an effective and efficient route to achieve the desired outcome of creating a solid fill layer.

For instance, capturing snapshots, creating new shapes, or freehand drawing involve other specific tools such as the Snapshot, Shape tools, or Brush tools, respectively. Each of these has its unique capabilities, but they do not sample colors from an image like the Eyedropper tool does.
