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Explanations

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1. What term means to approve a constitutional amendment or treaty?

Formal approval through a sanctioned process is what this term captures. When an amendment or a treaty is ready to take effect, the necessary step is to ratify it. In the United States, constitutional amendments must be ratified by the states to become part of the Constitution, and treaties require the Senate's formal consent (usually a two-thirds vote) before they become binding. Propose refers to bringing forward an idea, not granting formal approval. Enact means to put a law or treaty into effect after approval, and adopt is a broad term for accepting or starting to use something, not the specific act of formal approval. Because ratify specifically denotes this formal approval step, it is the best fit.

Two railroad companies built the Transcontinental Railroad. One began in Sacramento, California and pushed eastward, while the other started in Omaha, Nebraska and moved westward. They met at Promontory Summit, Utah, in 1869, completing the first continuous line across the United States. The Central Pacific Railroad carried out the western portion, relying heavily on Chinese labor, while the Union Pacific Railroad carried out the eastern portion with Irish workers and Civil War veterans. This huge project was funded by the Pacific Railway Acts, which provided land grants and government bonds to support construction. That combination—Central Pacific from the west and Union Pacific from the east—is why those two names are the answer. The other options involve a canal or companies that did not participate in building the transcontinental crossing.

Brown v. Board of Education is the case that led to desegregation in schools. It ruled that racial segregation in public schools is unconstitutional because it violates the Equal Protection Clause of the 14th Amendment, and it stated that separate educational facilities are inherently unequal. This decision overturned the idea that separating students by race could be legal as long as facilities were "equal," and it mandated that schools begin desegregation. The other cases address different issues or contexts. One arose from the history of slavery and citizenship and did not focus on education or desegregation. Another case deals with abortion rights. The remaining case previously upheld segregation under a "separate but equal" standard and was overturned by Brown in the education context.

The main idea here is naming the effort to end slavery. Abolition describes the movement to end slavery—the collective push, goals, and actions aimed at outlawing slavery. It encapsulates what people were fighting for and working toward as a system-wide change, not just the act of freeing individuals. Emancipation refers to the freeing of enslaved people themselves, which is the result rather than the movement. Abolitionism points to the people and ideas behind the movement, but the question asks for the movement itself, so abolition is the best fit. The Emancipation Proclamation is a specific historical document that proclaimed freedom in certain areas, not the broader movement.

The main idea here is that the Industrial Revolution brought a shift from small-scale, handmade work done at home to large, machine-powered factories. Machines driven by steam engines needed fuel, and coal became the key energy source, allowing factories to run continuously, produce goods faster, and organize labor on a large scale. This combination—machines in factories fueled by coal—defined the transformation from artisanal, home-based production to mass production in centralized places. Handmade goods produced in home workshops describe the pre-industrial era where most work happened by individuals or families at home. Wind-powered factories were not the hallmark of the period, since wind was unreliable and not scalable for the industrial changes. Automation using consumer computers belongs to a much later stage of technological development, not the era of the Industrial Revolution.

A cultural moment that lifted African American art, music, and literature into the national spotlight and used that visibility to push for greater equality. It celebrated African American culture across the arts, promoting pride in Black identity and actively challenging the racist stereotypes that had limited how Black people were seen. By growing audiences for writers like Langston Hughes and Zora Neale Hurston, musicians like Duke Ellington, and other artists, it showed that Black creativity mattered to American culture as a whole. This affirmation helped lay groundwork for civil rights by fueling dialogue about race, expanding networks of Black artists and thinkers, and demonstrating the value of Black contributions to society. It did not bring immediate school desegregation, and it did not reduce interest in Black arts; instead, it broadened appreciation and support for Black cultural expression.

Impressment is the act of forcing someone into military service, usually sailors, by a navy. In this historical context, the British Royal Navy would stop American ships and press eligible sailors into service on British vessels, often taking men who were American-born or had ties to the United States. This caused deep resentment in the United States and contributed to tensions between the two countries. This is different from drafting soldiers for the U.S. Army, which is conscription; it's not about seizing ships in neutral waters, which would be about attacking or capturing vessels; and it isn't about imposing a trade embargo, which is an economic restriction. The behavior described by impressment specifically involves compelling sailors to serve on British ships.

Understanding how the Grandfather Clause used ancestry to bypass voting restrictions. This gave an advantage to white voters whose ancestors were eligible to vote before the Civil War, while many Black citizens' ancestors were enslaved and could not vote before that date, effectively suppressing their suffrage. Other options like literacy tests, land ownership, or poll taxes were the kinds of barriers the clause aimed to circumvent for certain people, not criteria used to determine eligibility in general.

When large corporations and monopolies grew in the late 1800s, markets became less competitive because a few firms gained control over entire industries. This centralized power meant they could set prices and limit consumer options, which is why there were strong concerns about consumer protection and labor practices. The idea that competition would increase or that prices would stay the same doesn't fit the era's reality, since these dominant firms often kept prices higher or dictated terms to smaller competitors. Worker rights didn't see immediate, broad improvements under these monopolies, though later reforms and antitrust laws aimed to curb their power and address those concerns.

Elizabeth Cady Stanton played a foundational role in the women's rights movement, organizing the Seneca Falls Convention and drafting the Declaration of Sentiments that argued for women's voting rights. She also supported temperance, tying reform for moral improvement to political equality for women. Her leadership in pushing suffrage and her involvement with temperance reform make her the best match for this description.
