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Explanations

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1. Which meeting in 1787 produced the United States Constitution?

- A. Continental Congress
- B. Philadelphia Convention
- C. Constitutional Convention**

The main idea here is identifying the assembly that produced the framework for the U.S. government. In 1787, delegates gathered in Philadelphia to revise the Articles of Confederation, but they ended up drafting a new framework that became the United States Constitution. This meeting is known formally as the Constitutional Convention. The Philadelphia Convention is another common reference, since it happened in Philadelphia, but the official name for the event that produced the Constitution is the Constitutional Convention. The earlier Continental Congresses governed under the Articles of Confederation and did not create the Constitution.

2. What was a major goal of the Populist movement?

The main idea behind the Populist movement is that it aimed to reform the economy and politics to help farmers and workers who faced debt, falling crop prices, and the costs imposed by railroad monopolies. They argued that the government should be more responsive to the producing classes and use policy to ease debt and expand economic opportunity. This included ideas like increasing the money supply (such as coinage of silver) to inflate prices, implementing a graduated income tax, and regulating or even government-ownership of railroads. They also favored reforms to give ordinary people more political power, like direct election of Senators. This focus on domestic reform to aid primary producers and laborers contrasts with expansionist aims abroad, which the Populists did not prioritize. Prohibition, while occurring in the era, was not the central goal of the Populist platform. And supporting industrial monopolies would run directly against their push to curb the power of big business and railroads.

This question focuses on how Reconstruction used federal power to protect newly freed Black citizens and reshape Southern politics. The Military Reconstruction Act of 1867 imposed military governance over the former Confederacy, dividing the South into five military districts under Union generals. It tied reentry to the Union to concrete conditions: each state had to draft new constitutions that guaranteed Black male voting rights and ratify the 14th Amendment, which established citizenship and equal protection under the law. This combination of military oversight and constitutional requirements was designed to enforce civil rights where Southern governments resisted change. The other options don't fit. The Emancipation Proclamation freed enslaved people in Confederate states but did not reorganize Southern governance or set up military districts. The Homestead Act dealt with western land settlement, not voting rights or postwar reconstruction. The Compromise of 1877 ended military occupation in the South, rather than initiating the district plan or the 14th Amendment requirements.

A key pattern of 21st century U.S. domestic policy is how security concerns, major social reform, and privacy debates intertwined in daily government action. The 9/11 attacks led to a fundamental reorientation of domestic policy around safety and counterterrorism. Legislation like the Patriot Act expanded the powers of intelligence and law enforcement, shaping how the government collects information, monitors threats, and coordinates across agencies. The wars launched in response to that era—Afghanistan and later Iraq—had wide-reaching domestic effects, influencing military spending, veterans' policy, and public opinion about foreign intervention and national security. At the same time, domestic policy also moved through large-scale reform, most notably the Affordable Care Act, which sought to extend health coverage, reshape the health-care system, and address costs and access—an enduring domestic policy priority. Privacy debates grew directly from these security measures and evolving technology, fueling ongoing tensions between protecting national security and protecting individual rights. The other options point to issues that are not the defining features of U.S. domestic policy in this century. They reference concerns tied to earlier historical periods—tariff and currency questions, the gold standard revival, and Prohibition era reforms—so they don't capture the central policy dynamics that characterized the era.

5. What were the major impacts of the Transcontinental Railroad?

The major impact being tested is how a single transportation link reshaped the country by tying distant regions together and enabling people to move and goods to circulate more easily. The Transcontinental Railroad connected the East and West coasts, slashing travel times and creating a truly national market for crops, cattle, minerals, manufactured goods, and mail. This accessibility made it practical for many to move west, spurring settlement, the growth of towns along rail lines, and the development of new industries in the West. That broad effect is why this option is the best. It captures both the physical link of the coasts and the resulting wave of westward settlement. The other statements don't fit as well: the railroad boosted commerce, not decreased it, by expanding markets and trade; standardized time zones were introduced to coordinate railroad schedules, not reduced; and rather than decreasing subsidies, the government provided substantial land grants and other support to finance railroad construction.

6. What device used electrical signals to send messages quickly over long distances?

The idea being tested is using electrical signals to move information quickly over long distances. The telegraph did exactly that: it sent coded electrical pulses along wires, which trained operators translated into letters using Morse code. This allowed messages to travel far faster than any prior method and helped connect cities and continents in near real time. Other options rely on sight (semaphore), reproduce printed text (printing press), or transmit voice (telephone) rather than sending rapid coded messages over long distances, and they don't capture the historical shift to rapid long-distance signaling as clearly as the telegraph.

7. Which event was a widespread nonviolent protest against racial segregation in Montgomery, Alabama?

*Nonviolent, mass action aimed at ending bus segregation in Montgomery, Alabama is exemplified by the Montgomery Bus Boycott. After Rosa Parks refused to give up her seat on a Montgomery city bus, the African American community organized a citywide boycott through the Montgomery Improvement Association, led by Martin Luther King Jr. The boycott lasted 381 days, with people carpooling, walking, and finding other ways to get around, creating powerful economic pressure on the city's transit system. The sustained effort helped lead to a Supreme Court ruling, *Browder v. Gayle*, in 1956 that segregation on public buses was unconstitutional, effectively desegregating Montgomery's buses. This moment showed how nonviolent, organized protest could drive significant social and legal change and energized the broader Civil Rights Movement. Other events—Freedom Rides challenging interstate bus segregation in 1961, the Selma to Montgomery March in 1965, and the Little Rock Nine school desegregation in Arkansas—took place in different contexts or locations and are not the same Montgomery-focused boycott.*

8. Which uprising in 1763, led by Ottawa leader Pontiac, challenged British western expansion into the Ohio Valley?

Resistance by Native Americans to British expansion into the Ohio Valley after the French and Indian War is the key idea. In 1763, Ottawa leader Pontiac united several tribes to push back against British forts and policies pushing west into their lands. They targeted settlements and strongholds around Detroit and throughout the Ohio Valley, aiming to curb British encroachment and preserve autonomy. This effort is known as Pontiac's Rebellion. The uprising highlighted how British policies would affect Native lands and helped push Britain to adopt measures like the Royal Proclamation of 1763 to try to stabilize relations by limiting colonial expansion west of the Appalachians. Other conflicts listed occurred in different times or contexts, not specifically this 1763 uprising led by Pontiac.

9. As a result of the Mexican-American War, the United States gained control of which present-day states?

The war's aftermath brought a large transfer of land from Mexico to the United States in what's called the Mexican Cession. The Treaty of Guadalupe Hidalgo in 1848 set the terms, and the United States gained control over vast western lands that would become several future states. Among the present-day states tied directly to that era of acquisition are California, Nevada, Utah, and Arizona. California became a state in 1850, Nevada in 1864, Utah in 1896, and Arizona followed in 1912. While the broader cession included additional territory that would later form New Mexico, Colorado, and Wyoming, the four states listed reflect the well-known western lands obtained through that war, making this choice the best fit given the options.

10. Which policy dynamic describes the role of international trade agreements and diplomacy in shaping the late 20th-century global economy?

Opening markets through negotiated rules and using international diplomacy to coordinate trade policy defines how the global economy was shaped in the late 20th century. Trade liberalization means reducing barriers like tariffs and quotas, making it easier for countries to buy and sell goods and services across borders. Diplomacy through international agreements provides a stable, rules-based framework for these exchanges, with negotiations, dispute resolution, and enforcement that keep markets open and predictable. During this period, this approach was embodied by rounds of tariff reductions under GATT leading to the creation of the World Trade Organization, the expansion of regional blocs like the European community and NAFTA, and the broader push to standardize rules for goods, services, and investment. The result was greater economic integration, with countries specializing and markets becoming more interconnected. This is the best fit because it captures both the opening of trade and the collaborative, rule-based planning that guided international economic relations, rather than retreat into isolation, relying only on domestic policy, or using tariffs without reciprocity.
