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Explanations

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1. Which elements should a standard EHR order entry include?

- A. Only patient demographics and vitals.

A standard EHR order entry should include a complete, auditable set of clinical and administrative details that tie the request to the correct patient and justify the care being ordered. This means patient identifiers to ensure the order goes to the right chart, the date and time the order was placed for tracking and sequencing, the diagnosed condition to justify the need, any relevant current medications to avoid interactions, and the actual requests for lab tests or imaging along with the clinician's signature to authenticate the order. This combination supports patient safety, proper billing and documentation, and clear communication to the lab or imaging department. In contrast, demographics and vitals alone don't constitute an order, insurance information and billing codes are administrative factors rather than the clinical request, and appointment reminders or patient preferences pertain to scheduling rather than the clinical ordering process.

The main idea here is which medical specialty handles hormone-related disorders. Hormones and their glands define endocrinology, and doctors in this field treat conditions like diabetes and thyroid diseases because both are driven by hormonal imbalances. Diabetes involves insulin and glucose regulation, while thyroid conditions involve thyroid hormones that control metabolism. An endocrinologist specializes in diagnosing and managing these hormonal disorders, as well as related pituitary, adrenal, and metabolic issues. The other options point to organ-system specialties that aren't defined by hormone regulation—kidney-focused nephrology, heart-focused cardiology, and digestive-system gastroenterology. They may care for patients who also have hormonal problems, but their primary focus isn't hormonal disorders.

Inaccurate scheduling disrupts patient access, billing accuracy, and continuity of care. When appointments aren't tracked correctly, patients may miss visits or have awkward gaps in the day, leading to wasted time and disrupted workflows. Billing errors often follow from mismatched appointment times or incorrect service codes, which can cause claim denials or incorrect charges. That misalignment also creates care gaps, because follow-ups, tests, or timely interventions may be scheduled too late or not at all, compromising ongoing treatment. While flexible scheduling or smoother wait times sound beneficial, those outcomes rely on precise scheduling practices; without accuracy, they're unlikely and can even be counterproductive.

In a fee-for-service setup, providers are paid for each individual test or procedure they perform. That payment structure creates a strong incentive to order more services, because each one adds to revenue regardless of whether it's strictly necessary. The main risk here is overtreatment: patients may undergo unnecessary testing or procedures, which increases overall costs for both the patient and the health system and can expose patients to avoidable risks. This model does not guarantee lower costs; in fact, costs tend to rise with higher volumes of services. It also doesn't inherently reduce the number of services or stabilize pricing, since charges can vary and are driven by the number of billable services rather than by value or outcomes.

Obstetricians focus on pregnancy and childbirth, covering prenatal care during pregnancy, labor and delivery, and postpartum care after birth. They monitor fetal development and maternal health, manage any complications, and plan the delivery. Newborn care after birth is typically provided by pediatricians or neonatologists, not the obstetrician, who coordinates with the pediatric team for the newborn. Kidney-related diseases fall under nephrology, and digestive system diseases fall under gastroenterology. So the care described—prenatal, childbirth, and postnatal care for pregnant patients—is exactly what an obstetrician provides.

Telehealth means delivering healthcare services remotely using technology so patients and clinicians can connect without being in the same place. It includes video visits, phone calls, secure messaging, and remote monitoring on online platforms, enabling assessment, advice, scheduling, or management of conditions from a distance. The option describing healthcare services provided virtually, often through video calls or online platforms, matches this idea exactly because it highlights the remote, technology-enabled nature of care. The other choices don't fit telehealth as the main way care is delivered: in-person only visits require physical presence; vaccine administration must occur in person to give the shot; ER triage is typically done in the emergency department with direct patient contact, rather than through remote virtual care.

The key idea here is how a Medical Assistant is allowed to administer vaccines, which hinges on delegation, supervision, and state rules. In many settings, a physician or another licensed clinician can delegate vaccine administration to a Medical Assistant either under direct supervision or through standing orders. The Medical Assistant must have completed proper training that covers injection technique, vaccine storage and handling, patient screening and consent, accurate documentation, and how to recognize and respond to adverse reactions. Because immunization regulations are defined by each state, the exact level of allowed supervision and the specific training required can vary from one state to another. That's why this option is the best: it acknowledges the need for supervision or standing orders plus appropriate training, with the important caveat that it depends on state law. The other ideas fall short because they assume no supervision is needed, restrict administration to hospital settings only, or require a pharmacology exam as the sole gatekeeper, none of which universally apply.

Medical Laboratory Technicians focus on analyzing patient specimens to generate data that helps diagnose and monitor disease. They perform diagnostic tests on blood, urine, and other bodily fluids using automated instruments and manual methods, measuring cells, chemicals, and other components to provide information doctors use to decide on treatment and track progress. Examples include complete blood counts, metabolic panels, urinalysis, and microbiology cultures. They also handle specimen labeling, preparation, and quality control to ensure accurate results. Imaging studies like X-rays or CT scans are done by radiologic technologists, surgical procedures are performed by surgeons, and prescribing medications is done by physicians or other licensed prescribers.

RNs enter practice through formal nursing education that leads to licensure. The typical backgrounds are an Associate Degree in Nursing, a hospital-based diploma program, or a Bachelor of Science in Nursing. These programs provide the required nursing coursework and supervised clinical experience, preparing you to sit for the NCLEX-RN licensure exam. Once you pass, you're licensed to practice as an RN. A medical degree is for physicians, not RNs, and a certificate in medical assisting reflects a different role. A high school diploma alone isn't enough to qualify for RN licensure. So the standard educational route is one of the recognized nursing programs that prepare you for licensure.

This question focuses on how a plan uses a fixed network and a gatekeeper to coordinate care. In a Health Maintenance Organization, the plan contracts with a defined set of doctors, hospitals, and other providers, creating an in-network system you must use for coverage. You choose a primary care physician who coordinates all your care and must provide referrals to see specialists. Because care is managed through that PCP and kept within the network, costs are typically lower, but you have less choice and out-of-network services are usually not covered except in emergencies. Indemnity plans let you see any doctor and don't hinge on a fixed network or referrals, though you pay more out of pocket. Preferred Provider Organizations offer more flexibility and generally don't require referrals for specialists, with higher costs for out-of-network care. Point-of-Service plans mix elements of these, but the defining feature described—contracting with specific providers and requiring referrals to specialists—fits an HMO.
