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Explanations

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1. When driving through a highway work zone, what should you watch for?

- A. Watch for sharp pavement drop-offs**
- B. Increase speed to pass quickly
- C. Ignore the work zone and maintain normal distance
- D. Follow other drivers closely

In a highway work zone, the road surface can change abruptly, with edges that drop away sharply. Watching for these pavement drop-offs helps you stay centered in your lane and avoid driving off the edge, which can damage tires, cause a loss of control, or lead to a crash. Slow down, maintain a safe following distance, and stay alert for workers and equipment. Rushing through, ignoring the work zone, or tailing other vehicles all reduce your ability to react to sudden changes or instructions from road signs and workers, making them unsafe choices.

2. When you are behind a school bus that has stopped outside city limits and its red flashers are on, you should:

- A. Stop behind the bus and honk to get its attention

Red flashing lights on a school bus mean children may be getting on or off, so traffic must stop to keep them safe. If you're behind the bus and its red flashers are active, you need to stop at least 20 feet away and wait until the lights stop flashing and the bus moves again. That 20-foot distance gives you space to react and prevents passing too close to kids who might be crossing or entering the bus. Honking or trying to pass isn't appropriate, and turning around to find another route isn't the right move—you simply wait until it's safe to proceed.

3. A flashing yellow arrow in the left turn lane indicates you may:

- A. Slow down and turn when the intersection is clear**
- B. Proceed immediately without slowing
- C. Stop and wait for a green arrow

A flashing yellow left-turn signal means you may turn left, but only after slowing down and yielding to oncoming traffic and pedestrians. It's a warning to proceed with caution, not a free pass to go immediately. Look for a safe gap in opposing traffic and crosswalk pedestrians, and complete the turn only when the intersection is clear. If traffic or pedestrians prevent a safe turn, wait until it's safe. This fits because you're allowed to turn left when safe, rather than requiring a full stop or forcing you to go straight or proceed without slowing.

Staying calm by giving other drivers the benefit of the doubt helps prevent road rage. When you assume they're doing their best or are briefly distracted, you're less likely to take their actions as personal slights. That paves the way for a patient, measured response instead of a heated reaction, which keeps you in control and reduces the chance of unsafe driving. This approach works better than arguing with other drivers, which inflames tension and can turn a small annoyance into a confrontation. It's also safer than speeding up to finish first, a tactic that raises risk for everyone on the road and can provoke more anger in others. Ignoring the problem might seem easier, but it often lets anger build up and can lead to impulsive, unsafe behavior later. If you notice rising anger, take a moment to breathe, slow down, and give extra space. If needed, safely pull over and reset before continuing.

When approaching a roundabout, the essential rule is to yield to traffic already circulating inside the circle. Vehicles in the roundabout have the right of way, so you slow down, look for a safe gap, and merge only when there is room. Once you're in the circle, keep moving and follow your chosen exit, signaling as you approach it. You also need to yield to pedestrians as you reach crosswalks around the roundabout. The idea of always yielding to pedestrians isn't accurate because you only yield where pedestrians have the right of way, and the fundamental safety rule is to yield to vehicles already in the circulating lane to merge safely.

6. Construction zone vehicles are typically described as which?

Construction zone vehicles are usually large and slow moving. Heavy machinery like bulldozers, excavators, dump trucks, and other equipment used in road work can't travel quickly due to their size, weight, and the loads they carry. This slower pace helps keep workers safe and gives drivers more time to react to equipment entering or leaving the roadway or to changes in traffic patterns. Bright colors are common for visibility, but the defining trait you'll notice most across many work zones is their large size and slower speed. When you see construction activity, slow down, increase following distance, and be prepared for sudden stops or lane shifts.

7. During a tire blowout, drivers should primarily maintain control by:

When a tire blows, the priority is to keep the vehicle under control by focusing on steering. A burst tire can grab the car and pull toward the damaged side, so you need a firm, steady grip and smooth steering to guide the car in a straight path toward a safe area. Braking hard or abruptly can cause the wheels to lock or the car to skid, making control harder, so braking immediately is not the right move. Shifting to neutral isn't helpful here and can reduce traction and steering effectiveness, depending on the vehicle. Stopping right away in the roadway creates a new hazard for oncoming traffic and you're unlikely to be able to safely move the car off the road if you haven't already steered toward a shoulder. Instead, ease off the accelerator, keep a firm grip on the wheel, steer to stay in your lane, and gradually slow and pull over when you can do so safely.

When you turn, you finalize your plan by confirming the exact path you intend to follow. This last check ensures the lane you'll end up in is clear and correctly positioned, so you won't drift into another lane or hit an obstacle as you complete the turn. Earlier checks—like adjusting speed, signaling, and scanning for oncoming traffic, pedestrians, or bicycles—still matter, but the final step is to verify that the path itself is safe and legal before you commit to the turn. Fuel level or merely checking mirrors don't determine the safety of the turn; the crucial last check is that your intended path is clear.

9. Are left turns on red allowed in Michigan?

In Michigan, a left turn on red is allowed only in a specific situation: you may turn left on red after coming to a complete stop if you're turning from a one-way street onto another one-way street, and there are no signs prohibiting it. This setup reduces conflicts with oncoming traffic because both streets are one-way, making the turn movements more predictable. You must yield to all traffic and pedestrians before proceeding. If either street is not one-way, or you're turning onto a two-way street, a left turn on red is not allowed. Also, signs can prohibit this maneuver, so always look for a No Left Turn on Red sign. Turning into a driveway isn't the scenario this rule covers.

In city driving you need to scan well ahead to anticipate hazards and changes in traffic. Looking a block ahead gives you enough time to see signals, brake lights, pedestrians, and cars that may slow or turn before you reach them. It helps you smooth your speed, plan lane positioning, and brake gradually rather than reacting at the last moment, which reduces the risk of rear-end collisions and sudden stops in dense streets. Glancing at the dashboard or looking straight at the hood pulls your eyes away from the road and wastes precious reaction time. Checking side mirrors is important for checking surrounding traffic, but it doesn't replace the need to monitor what's coming far ahead.
