1. When is it appropriate to pass another vehicle?

Passing should be done only when you have a clear opportunity and can finish before a no-passing zone ends. This means you must have good visibility far enough ahead to judge the gap, enough space in the other lane to complete the pass, and a safe way to return to your lane without cutting off the vehicle you're passing. On two-lane roads, the dashed line shows where passing is allowed if it's safe; solid lines indicate no passing. You should always signal, check mirrors and blind spots, and ensure there's no oncoming traffic that would prevent you from completing the maneuver safely. Relying on another driver's signal does not make a pass safe or legal—you still need to assess real road conditions and the legality of the maneuver.

Warning signs warn you about hazards or changes in the road ahead so you can slow down or prepare to react. School zone and deer crossing signs are classic warning signs—they alert you to potential activity or danger in that area. An exit sign, however, is a guide/information sign that tells you where to leave the highway or which ramp to take. It doesn't warn of a hazard ahead. Speed limit signs are regulatory signs that tell you the maximum speed allowed. Since the exit sign provides information rather than warning of danger, it is not a warning sign.

3. What color are regulatory signs?

Regulatory signs are those that tell you a rule you must follow. They're designed to stand out and be read quickly, using colors that signal actions you need to take or obey. Red is used to indicate prohibitions and required actions (for example, stop signs and yield signs). White provides a high-contrast backdrop for clarity, and black is commonly used for the text or symbols on signs with white backgrounds, such as speed limits or other rules. Because regulatory signs use this mix to convey legal requirements, the colors red, white, and black cover the typical appearances you'll encounter. Other color schemes correspond to different kinds of signs: blue and white for services or information, yellow and black for warnings, and green and white for directional or guide information.

Motorcycle operators have the same rights and responsibilities as other drivers, including the right to use a full traffic lane when riding. This lets them be seen more easily and gives enough space to maneuver around hazards or obstacles. Riding too far to the right or hugging the curb can put the rider at risk from car doors, debris, or drivers who might not see them in time. Bike lanes are designed for bicycles, not motorized vehicles, so motorcycles aren't required to stay in a bike lane and are typically better off riding in a full lane with traffic.

Motorcycles can be hard to spot in traffic because they are much smaller than cars and can hide in blind spots or slip by in gaps between vehicles. Their low profile and size mean drivers may not notice them right away when changing lanes, merging, or turning, so you should actively scan for them and give extra space. Treat motorcycles as potential hazards and check mirrors and over your shoulder before maneuvers. The other ideas aren't reliable indicators of safety—noise level isn't a dependable cue, and motorcycles aren't inherently safe or exempt from needing space.

6. When you are following a motorcyclist, you should:

Give more following distance when you're behind a motorcyclist. Motorcyclists are smaller and harder to spot, and they can brake or maneuver suddenly to avoid hazards. With extra space, you have enough time to notice their brake lights or signals, react to any quick changes, and stop safely if they encounter a slick surface, debris, or an obstacle. This extra room also helps you stay out of their blind spots and gives you space to maneuver if they need to avoid trouble. Sticking with the same distance keeps you closer and reduces your reaction time, making a rear-end collision more likely if they brake hard or swerve. Pushing to pass immediately is unsafe because you may misjudge speed and clearance and put both of you at risk.

When you're approaching loose gravel, traction is reduced, so you want to slow down to keep control. Reducing speed before the gravel helps you maintain the tires' grip, decreases the chance of skidding or losing steering, and gives you more time to react to any rocks or ruts. Braking hard or accelerating quickly on gravel can cause the wheels to slip and the vehicle to slide or fishtail. So ease off the accelerator and slow down gradually before you reach the loose surface, then drive smoothly with gentle steering and braking as you pass through.

The main idea is that driving decisions hinge on using time and space to manage risk. You're constantly balancing how much space you have and how quickly you're moving, and the goal is to minimize danger in every situation. Reducing risk is the best approach because you can't remove all hazards you'll encounter, but you can lower the chance of a collision by adjusting your speed, increasing following distance, and being prepared to slow or stop for potential problems. For example, in wet or busy conditions, slowing down and giving more space to the vehicle ahead reduces the likelihood of a rear-end crash or losing control. Choosing to increase risk would make you more vulnerable, while trying to avoid risk completely isn't realistic in traffic, and ignoring risk is dangerous and unsafe. The right mindset is to continuously seek ways to reduce risk given the time and space you have.

Regulatory signs tell you the rules you must follow on the roads, and their main job is to control the movement of traffic by prescribing actions and prohibitions. They tell you what you must do or must not do, such as stopping at a stop sign, yielding, obeying a speed limit, or following lane-use rules. This creates predictable, orderly flow and helps prevent crashes. Other types of signs serve different purposes: warning signs alert you to hazards ahead, and informational signs provide directions, services, or distances. So regulatory signs are specifically about mandatory rules and restrictions that directly govern how you move through an intersection or road, which is why they control traffic movement.

10. The first thing you should do before deciding to pass on a two-lane road is:

The key step when considering a pass on a two-lane road is to check for oncoming traffic. You must confirm there is enough distance and time for you to complete the pass safely before any vehicle coming toward you reaches your lane. If an approaching vehicle is close, attempting a pass could lead to a head-on collision, so you wait until the way is clear. Hazard lights aren't the right signal here; they're for emergencies and can confuse other drivers, while simply speeding up behind the vehicle ahead is unsafe and can create a dangerous tailgating situation. Relying on the rearview mirror alone also isn't enough, because it only shows what's behind you and not whether an oncoming car is approaching in the opposing lane or whether there's a safe window to pass. You should scan ahead, use your signals, and, if it's clear, pass and then safely return to your lane once you can see the passed vehicle in your rearview mirror.
