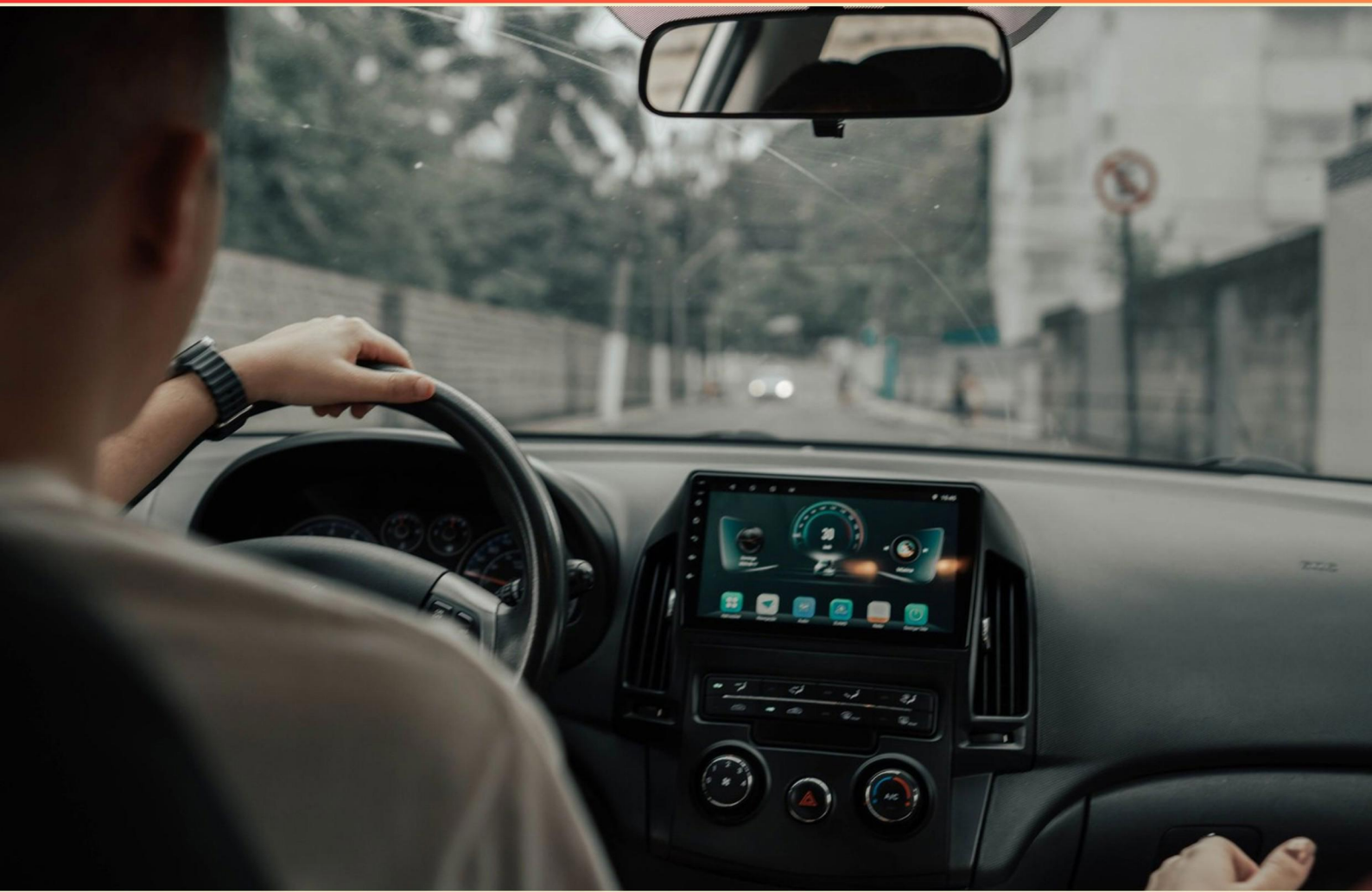

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Explanations

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1. Which of the following is a common reason your driver's license can be suspended?

- A. Paying all fines on time
- B. Violating GDL restrictions**
- C. Completing a driver education course
- D. Obtaining a new license plate

Violating GDL restrictions is a common reason a driver's license can be suspended because those limits are put in place to keep new drivers safe while they gain experience. When a teen breaks curfews, passenger limits, or other GDL rules, the licensing authority can suspend the license to curb risky driving and encourage compliance. Paying fines on time isn't a trigger for suspension; in fact, timely payments help you stay in good standing. Completing a driver education course is a step toward meeting requirements and improving skills, not a cause of suspension. Getting a new license plate deals with vehicle registration, not the status of your driving privilege.

2. Which statement about merging into expressway traffic is correct?

When entering expressway traffic, you want to blend with the flow. Do this by accelerating on the ramp to reach a speed that roughly matches the speed of the expressway and merge when you find a safe gap. Entering much slower disrupts the traffic, forcing others to brake or swerve and increasing crash risk. Going as fast as you can or faster than the traffic creates a mismatch that makes it harder for drivers to judge your vehicle's position and can lead to collisions. By aiming to be at or near the expressway speed, you can merge smoothly and maintain a safe distance from vehicles already on the road.

Electronic Stability Program is a system that helps a car stay in control when you steer suddenly or when traction is reduced. It watches how the car is actually moving (using sensors for steering input, speed, yaw, lateral force, and braking) and compares it to where you intend to go. If it detects a tendency to slide or spin—like understeer or oversteer—it can brake individual wheels and/or ease back engine power to steer the car back onto your intended path. This improves stability in slippery conditions, during sharp maneuvers, or at high speeds, and reduces the risk of losing control. The other phrases don't describe this stability system, though you may see the feature referred to as Electronic Stability Control in many vehicles.

4. Some expressway entrances come in from the left; what problem does this create?

The situation tests how merging traffic interacts with where the high-speed lane is used. When entrances come in from the left, vehicles entering must merge into the leftmost lane, which is typically the fastest, most-traveled lane used for passing and maintaining high speeds. That means entering drivers have to time their merge into fast-moving traffic and often do so with limited space, creating sudden speed changes, weaving, and a higher risk of conflicts with vehicles already in that lane. The core idea is that left-side entry ramps disrupt the flow of the fast lane, making merging more dangerous. The other ideas—left lanes having more exits, being narrower, or the merge area being shorter—aren't inherent results of left-side entrances and don't explain the safety issue as clearly.

5. If your brake system fails and you need to slow down, which action should you perform first?

When brakes fail, the priority is to slow the vehicle safely while maintaining steering control. The best first move is engine braking: downshift to a lower gear so the engine resists motion and helps reduce speed without relying on the brakes. After that, if hydraulic brakes aren't building pressure, pump the brake pedal a few times to try to restore it. If pressure returns, you can continue using the brakes normally; if not, gradually use the emergency brake while you steer toward a safe area. Keep the engine running to preserve power steering and brake assist, and aim for a safe location with your hazards on. Other approaches would leave you without control or speed reduction: turning hard to skid to a stop can cause you to lose steering, turning off the engine may remove steering and brake assist, and stopping in the middle of the road waiting for help is unsafe.

Before changing lanes, you must actively scan areas your mirrors can't show. The best method is a quick head-turn to look over your shoulder in the direction you plan to move. This head-check reveals vehicles, cyclists, or other hazards in your blind spots that your rear-view and side mirrors may miss. Relying solely on mirrors can leave those areas unseen, which is why a physical shoulder check is essential. Honking or speeding up don't provide the necessary visual confirmation and can create new risks or startled drivers. So, turning your head to look left or right before changing lanes is the proper, safest way to ensure the lane change can be made safely.

7. Which traffic control device is most commonly associated with roundabouts?

The main idea is how entering drivers interact with traffic already in the circle. Roundabouts are designed so that vehicles entering yield to those already circulating. The sign that communicates this rule at each entrance is the yield sign. It tells drivers to slow down, check for gaps in the circulating traffic, and enter only when it's safe, which keeps traffic flowing smoothly without unnecessary stops. A stop sign would require a full stop even when traffic is clear, which disrupts flow. A speed limit sign controls speed but doesn't govern who enters first. A do not enter sign would block access, which isn't how roundabouts are designed to operate.

Before you start to pass on a two-lane road, the first and most important check is to make sure you may legally pass and that there is no oncoming traffic in the left lane. This means being in a designated passing zone and having a clear view far enough ahead to complete the pass safely without forcing vehicles in the opposite lane to slow or brake abruptly. If it's legal and the oncoming lane is clear, you can then signal and proceed with the maneuver. Looking in the rearview mirror helps you monitor traffic behind, but it won't tell you whether there's approaching traffic in the opposing lane or whether passing is allowed. Checking the road surface matters for traction, but it doesn't establish whether the pass is permitted or safe from oncoming vehicles.

9. In attention-heavy driving conditions, what is the purpose of increasing following distance?

When your attention is stretched and you're processing a lot of information, your ability to notice hazards and react quickly is reduced. Increasing the distance to the vehicle ahead creates a safety buffer that gives you more time to perceive a problem, decide on a course of action, and brake or steer to avoid a collision. That extra space is what helps prevent rear-end crashes in busy or distracting driving conditions. It's not about saving fuel, speeding up merges, or frustrating others. In practice, aim for a longer following distance in heavy traffic, poor weather, or low visibility—typically a few seconds of space rather than a quick, minimal gap.

10. Construction zone signs are typically which color?

A. Orange sign.

Signs in work zones use a color system that quickly communicates the type of information to drivers. Construction zone signs are orange to signal a temporary work area, so drivers know to slow down, follow posted instructions, and anticipate changes like lane shifts or workers on or near the roadway. Orange stands out against most backgrounds and is designed for strong visibility in daylight and at night because of reflective material. In contrast, red indicates stops or prohibitions, blue signals services, and yellow is general caution; these colors serve different purposes, which is why orange is chosen specifically for construction and maintenance warnings.
