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Explanations

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1. What are the primary functions of military working dogs (MWDs)?

Military working dogs are trained to deter threats and protect the handler. Their presence alone can stop or slow would-be attackers, creating a psychological barrier that reduces risk before any action is needed. In addition, they provide active protection during operations by responding to danger and guarding the handler, using controlled, trained defense to shield the team. This combination—deterrence plus reliable protection—makes the handler-dog team a strong security asset in hostile environments. While MWDs may perform other tasks, these functions focus on safety and security for the team, rather than logistics, public messaging, or unrelated duties.

Severe heat injury is heat stroke, where the body loses its ability to regulate temperature and organ systems begin to fail. The best option shows extreme hyperthermia (a rectal temperature around 108°F), a body that's hot to the touch, and multiple systemic and neurological signs—vomiting, pale mucous membranes, abnormal mentation or consciousness, seizures, diarrhea, shock, and possible death. This combination signals life-threatening heat stress with CNS involvement and likely multi-organ damage, which is what defines a severe case. Less severe scenarios don't meet that threshold: lethargy with a normal temperature could be an illness or fatigue; mild panting with clear mucous membranes indicates only mild heat stress; mild dehydration is a general sign and not specific to severe heat injury. In practice, a very high temperature plus altered mentation or other systemic signs is the red flag for emergency heat stroke.

The other options mix products that target similar parasite groups or include alternatives that aren't aligned with the same simple monthly plan, making the combination less consistent with a standard two-pronged monthly protocol.

MWD teams gain their security edge from senses beyond sight—primarily smell and hearing. A trained dog can detect intruders, track scents, and alert the handler even when visibility is poor. In darkness or low light, line security police rely on vision, which is severely reduced, so their effectiveness decreases. The dog's acute sense of smell and ability to work by sound keep patrols effective and often surpass what a human-only team can achieve under those conditions. In bright daylight, visibility is not a limiter, and in heavy rain or high wind, scent and acoustic cues can become more variable, so the advantage isn't as pronounced. Therefore, darkness or poor visibility is the time frame where MWD teams can exceed line security capabilities without the limitations that light imposes on human sight.

Explosive detector dogs must maintain 95% accuracy because missing an actual explosive can have catastrophic consequences, so training standards aim for near-perfect reliability. This high target ensures a strong safety margin in real-world searches and is reinforced through ongoing evaluation and maintenance to keep performance at or above that level in varied conditions. The other targets, proposing lower percentages for explosives or drug detectors, don't provide the same safety margin, so they aren't the standard used for high-risk explosive detection.

The important point is that 341 TRS is responsible for building complete MWD teams, not just dogs or a security function. Their mission is to provide the full lineup needed for effective MWD operations: trained MWDs, the handlers who work with them, the trainers who develop both dogs and people, and kennel masters who manage the kennels and animal welfare. This integrated capability ensures ready-to-deploy, fully qualified teams for security, detection, and response missions. The other options don't capture this combined, team-focused role: one focuses only on the dogs, another on base security as a whole, and another on deployment without highlighting the training pipeline across dogs and people.

The key idea is that they are in the blood and capable of causing illness, which is why this statement is correct. The other options describe microorganisms in air or water or claim they cannot cause disease, which does not fit what a pathogen is. In practice, this concept underpins safety practices that treat all blood as potentially infectious and use proper protective measures to prevent exposure.

Normal resting respiratory rate for a Military Working Dog is about 10 to 30 breaths per minute. This reflects calm, unlabored breathing with the chest and abdomen rising smoothly. If the dog is resting but breathing faster than this, it can indicate heat stress, pain, fever, or illness and warrants checking the dog's condition. Very high rates, such as 30–60 breaths per minute, usually point to panting from exertion or heat rather than normal resting breathing. Rates well below 10 breaths per minute are uncommon in a healthy resting dog and could indicate bradypnea or sedation. In short, 10–30 is the standard resting range; the other values reflect states outside normal rest.

The other options describe roles for different types of dogs or security tasks that aren't the primary focus of an explosive-detection team.
