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Explanations

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1. If you sort the city names alphabetically, which is first?

- A. Atkinson
- B. Green Bay
- C. Hubbard
- D. Appleton**

Sorting names alphabetically means comparing letters from the start and choosing the one that would come first in the alphabet. Here, two names start with A: Appleton and Atkinson. The second letter is p in Appleton and t in Atkinson; since p comes before t, Appleton comes first. The other names start with letters after A, so they come later. So Appleton is the first city in alphabetical order.

2. Greentree: Which code corresponds to Greentree?

- A. Greentree**
- B. Bender
- C. County Line
- D. Mill

In this type of map-from-location-to-code question, the correct code is the one that exactly matches the location name. The code for Greentree is Greentree, so that option is the best pick. The other names—Bender, County Line, Mill—refer to different locations and would have their own codes, not Greentree. So Greentree is the only choice that corresponds to Greentree.

3. Which street corresponds to the 4E route?

- A. Holton
- B. Booth
- C. Pierce
- D. Buffum**

Route-number to street alignment is what this item is about. The 4E designation points to a specific east–west corridor on the city's route map, and Buffum Street is the street that sits on that corridor in the system used here. The other streets listed do not lie on that 4E corridor, so they don't match the route's assigned street. That's why Buffum is the correct match for the 4E route.

4. If given code 60S, which surname is it?

- A. Ramsey
- B. Jewell
- C. Salem
- D. Henry**

Decoding codes that map to surnames uses a fixed reference or key. The code you're given, 60S, is interpreted according to that key, and in the set used for this question it designates the surname Henry. That's why this one stands out as the correct match—the other surnames don't align with the 60S entry in the same coding system, so they don't fit when decoded with the same key. When you study these, focus on learning the specific code-to-surname mapping used in your course material, then apply it consistently to decode each item rather than guessing.

5. Which coordinate is Wright associated with?

- A. 34N
- B. 26N
- C. 25N**
- D. 32N

Understand how to read latitude lines on a map. Latitude shows how far north a place is from the equator, with lines labeled in degrees. The mark for Wright sits exactly on the line labeled 25 degrees north, so the associated latitude is 25N. The other numbers would place a point farther north on the map, higher up from Wright's position, which doesn't match where Wright is shown. If you're ever unsure, locate the marker and see which latitude line it sits on—the value of that line is the correct coordinate.

6. Which name corresponds to 25S?

- A. Burnham
- B. Grant
- C. Cleveland
- D. Arthur**

Understanding how to read a code-to-name mapping helps you identify which name goes with a given code. When a list pairs codes with names, you locate the code and read the name exactly from the same line. For this item, the code shown is 25S. In the provided mapping, 25S is paired with Arthur, so Arthur is the name that matches this code. The other names—Burnham, Grant, and Cleveland—are linked to different codes, so they aren't the match for the code shown. If you ever misread the code, double-check the exact characters to ensure you're reading the correct pairing.

7. Which name is paired with 8S?

- A. Walker
- B. National**

- D. Mineral

In a city grid, a number with a side label like 8S is a north-south street location, and the cross streets that run east-west have names. To locate a place, you match the north-south street with the cross-street name at that intersection. For Milwaukee's grid, 8S intersects with National Avenue, so the name paired with 8S is National. The other names are cross streets in different parts of the grid and don't line up with 8S at that intersection. This kind of reading lets you navigate accurately on maps or in dispatch directions.

8. Which name is listed for 28S?

- A. Montana
- B. Dakota
- C. Euclid
- D. Manitoba

The main idea is understanding how a fixed code maps to a specific name in a reference list. In this item, the code 28S is tied to Montana in the chart or dataset used for the question. That specific pairing is the reason Montana is the correct pick: the chart assigns 28S to Montana, while the other names belong to other codes and do not correspond to 28S. When studying, memorize or reference the code-name mappings in the chart so you can quickly match each code to its assigned name.

9. Which surname is matched with 55S?

- A. Parnell
- B. Klein
- C. Grange
- D. Edgerton

This question tests your ability to use a code key that links codes to surnames. The correct answer comes from the chart or key provided in your study materials, which shows that the code 55S corresponds to Grange. So Grange is the best match because it's the surname listed next to that exact code in the key. The other surnames don't fit because, in the same key, they are paired with different codes and not with 55S. Always verify the specific code-to-name mappings in your current materials, since the exact pairings can vary between editions or practice sets.

10. Which name is paired with 14S?

- A. Orchard
- B. National
- C. Washington
- D. Greenfield

In this kind of map-grid reasoning, a number with a direction (like 14S) identifies a specific block, and it's paired with the cross-street name that runs across that same area. For Milwaukee's common quiz grid, the 14S block is paired with Greenfield Avenue, so the correct match is Greenfield. The other street names exist in the city, but they correspond to different blocks or grid pairs, not the 14S pairing shown in this item.
