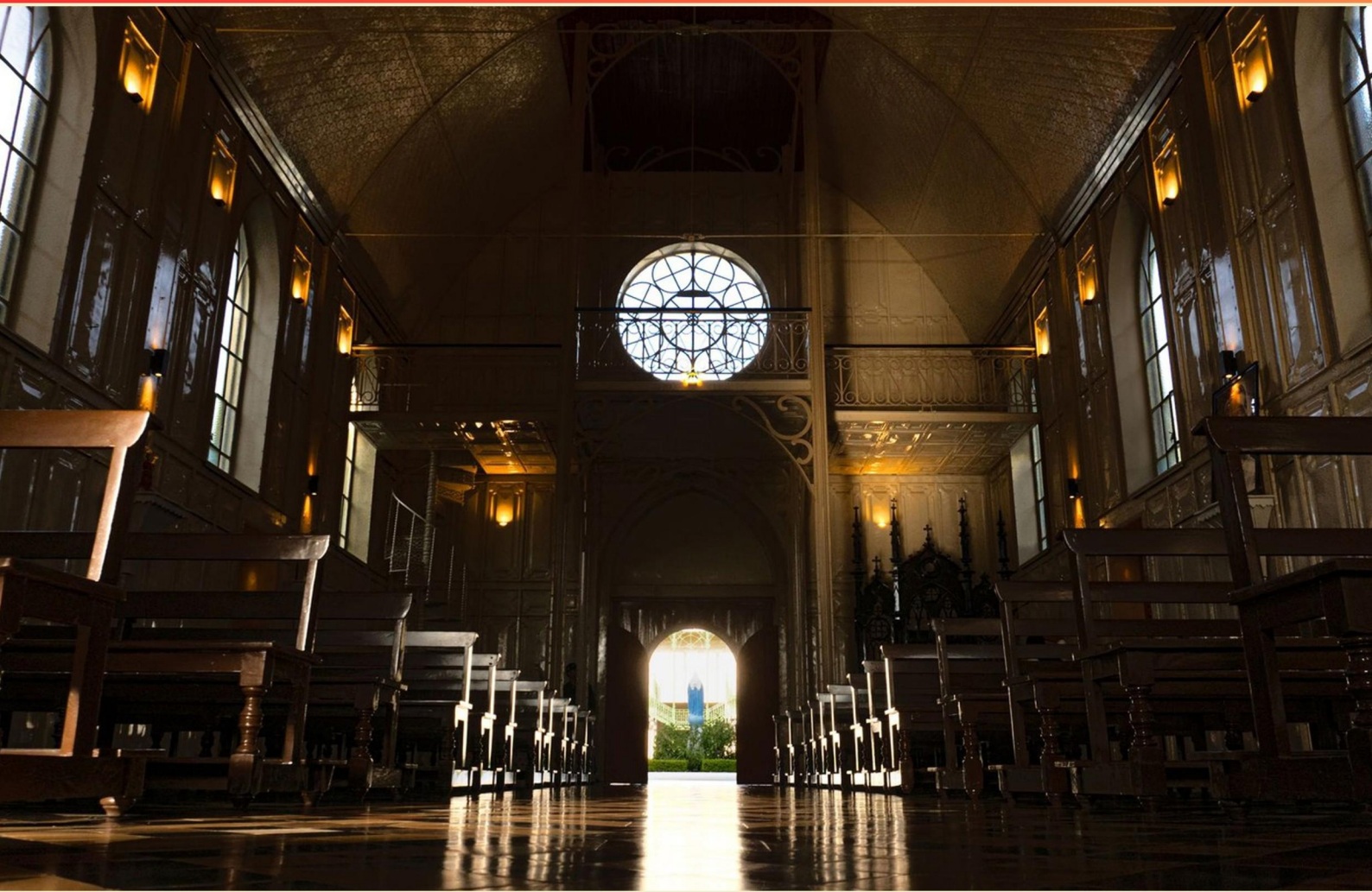

Hebrews 4:16 encourages believers to approach the throne of grace boldly, emphasizing confidence in God's presence rather than detailing the righteousness that allows for that access. Roman 5:18 is thus pivotal in illustrating how righteousness granted through Christ leads to renewed relationship and direct access to God for believers.
