This step represents an escalation in force that is still controlled and aimed at avoiding lethal outcomes. Lastly, "lethal force" is the final option, which is typically used only in situations where an officer believes their life or the lives of others are in imminent danger. This reflects a balance between the need for law enforcement to ensure safety and the preservation of individuals' Fourth Amendment rights against unreasonable searches. The need for a warrant, permission from the individual, or the immediate presence of a crime in order to conduct a search is not in line with the principles established in Terry, which emphasizes reasonable suspicion as the critical criterion for these situations.

For instance, while providing a list of local attorneys may be helpful, it is not an immediate need compared to information about shelters and rights. Assuring immediate arrest of the abuser is not always feasible due to legal standards and evidence requirements, and discussing the right to remain silent is more relevant in the context of criminal proceedings rather than immediate victim support.

Therefore, the presence of a traffic violation remains the primary justification for stopping a vehicle in Minnesota, aligning with the standards set forth in the Minnesota case law.

The distinction made by the other options revolves around different sentencing structures. Sentencing served at the same time would refer to concurrent sentences, while discussions of probationary periods and the length of sentences do not define the fundamental concept of how sentences are administered in a consecutive manner. Therefore, the focus should be on the sequential nature of how these sentences are served, which is precisely what a consecutive sentence entails.
