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## **Explanations**

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## 1. What does a sensor operator do?

- A. Controls the camera, communicates with 1P, helps maintain the intent**
- B. Maintains the objective**
- C. Sets mission parameters**
- D. Analyzes targets**

The sensor operator is the person who directly handles the imaging sensor during a mission. They actively control the camera—panning, tilting, zooming, focusing—and decide what the sensor should look at in real time. They stay in communication with the 1P to ensure the imagery collected matches the mission’s goals and intended coverage. By keeping the sensor aimed at the right areas and tracking moving objects, they help maintain the intended focus and ensure the collected data is useful for later analysis. Roles that involve setting the mission’s goals or parameters, or that revolve around analyzing targets, are handled by planners and analysts, not the operator who manages the sensor itself.

FOV decreases as focal length increases. That means lenses with shorter focal lengths show more of the scene (larger FOV), while longer focal lengths “zoom in” and show less (smaller FOV). When listing from largest to smallest FOV, you start with Ultra-wide (the widest view), then Wide, then Medium. After those fixed categories, the narrower options follow in order: Narrow-Medium is wider than Narrow, which is wider than Ultra-Narrow. Finally, zoom settings reduce the FOV further, so a 1.5x lens comes before a 3x lens because it has the larger FOV. So the sequence that matches largest to smallest FOV is Ultra-wide, Wide, Medium, Narrow-Medium, Narrow, Ultra-Narrow, 1.5x, 3x.

On the ops floor, the MM functions as the on-scene commander who drives the mission forward. This means conducting the missions, directing how resources are used, and keeping control of the assets so actions stay coordinated. The MM also conveys the overall guidance and intent to the 1P, helping the primary operator understand what needs to be done and why. The other options describe responsibilities like managing FMV resources or granting ultimate FMV authority, which belong to different roles or levels of oversight, and the idea of leading 2P and 3P shifts the emphasis away from guiding 1P with clear intent. Therefore, that description best fits the MM's responsibilities on the ops floor.

Screening often involves quickly categorizing a vehicle based on observable attributes. Vehicle type is a straightforward, observable characteristic—whether it's a car, truck, SUV, van, or motorcycle—that screeners can record without needing special equipment or documentation. This helps determine which procedures or restrictions apply. Engine size isn't readily apparent without inspection or documentation, passenger count can change and isn't a fixed vehicle attribute, and insurance status isn't a property of the vehicle itself but a legal/administrative detail that requires verification. So, vehicle type is the most reliable characteristic for screeners to note.

Maintaining masking intent hinges on clearly signaling and preserving concealment as you move. When following a masked person under an overhang, the best action is to step out to hold all sides of the masked area and communicate that you are masked with MM if needed. This creates a controlled boundary around the masked area, ensuring there are no gaps that could reveal faces or trigger unwanted attention, while also confirming to others that you are part of the masking effort. Saying you are masked helps coordinate and prevents misinterpretation about your role. Moving into a crowd or proceeding silently risks exposing you or losing the subtle coordination, and removing your mask defeats the purpose of masking.

Short-wave infrared imaging detects infrared radiation in a band that highlights warm sources and certain lighting, often usable when visible light is poor or obscured. This makes it especially good for following a vehicle by clearly capturing headlights and taillights, and for noticing interior or exterior lighting at a site, even in darkness or amid smoke, dust, or haze. Those capabilities align with surveillance scenarios where identifying and tracking targets relies on bright IR features, which is why this use best fits SWIR. Other options describe tasks that rely on different imaging strengths or conditions (terrain details, medical contexts, or wildlife photography), which don't align as directly with the described infrared lighting tracking.

The back row on the ops floor handles oversight of FMV work across the team. They also carry the responsibility to make the final analytic decision, integrating the results from the cell-level work and determining the conclusion when a decision needs synthesis. In addition, they hold ultimate FMV authority, able to finalize policy or override analyses as needed. Because these duties are interconnected, this role covers guiding the analysis, making the final call, and possessing the ultimate authority. Focusing on just one aspect would miss the broader oversight and accountability that the back row provides.

Understanding Islamic women's clothing centers on modest dress, where a hijab is a common head covering worn to cover hair and neck as a sign of modesty. While a scarf can be used as a head covering, the term hijab refers to this specific garment with religious and cultural significance. Hoodies and cardigans are general outerwear and not tied to Islamic dress. So, the item most closely associated with Islamic women's clothing among these options is the hijab.

In FMV operations, the labels 1P, 2P, and 3P refer to different FMV positions—the preset sensor viewpoints or look angles used to manage video feeds. They let operators switch quickly between the primary feed and backup angles to maintain coverage, track targets as they move, or compensate if the primary view is blocked or degraded. Typically, the first position is the main feed, with the second and third providing alternate perspectives or fields of view. This labeling is about how the video is configured and accessed, not about calibration, imagery types, or communication channels. So these terms denote FMV positions.

The main idea here is how masculine presentation is commonly linked to certain physical traits. Taller height, a broader build, and facial hair are classic visual cues many cultures associate with men. That makes the description of being taller than women, having a broader build, and facial hair the best fit. Other options mix traits that don't reliably signal masculinity. Being shorter with a gentle demeanor contradicts typical masculine stereotypes. Wearing dresses is associated with femininity, not masculinity. Driving ability isn't a gender-defining trait, and head coverings or bright colors aren't reliable markers of masculine presentation.
