"Let me give you a hand" suggests assistance or help but uses "hand" in a more idiomatic sense rather than as a stand-in for people. "A swelling of pride" conveys an emotion but does not fit the definition of metonymy because it does not involve a substitutive relationship based on an association. By contrast, being lengthy contradicts the very nature of what constitutes a short story. Therefore, indicating that a short story "must be lengthy" distinguishes it from the true characteristics that define the form.

Phonemes are the smallest units of sound in a language that can distinguish one word from another. They are not the meanings of words, which is the role of vocabulary (represented in choice A). Phonemes focus specifically on the auditory aspect, representing sounds that can be combined to form words. Therefore, option C accurately describes phonemes as the sounds that letters represent, making it the correct answer in this context.
