The example that illustrates the use of a prefix is the word "misspelling," which comes from the base word "spell." In this case, the prefix "mis-" is added to "spell" to create a new word that means to spell incorrectly. Prefixes are morphemes added to the beginning of a word to modify its meaning. The prefix "mis-" specifically indicates an error or incorrectness. In contrast, the other words reflect different types of word formation: "worker" is derived from "work" through the addition of the suffix "-er," indicating someone who performs the action of the verb; "careful" adds the suffix "-ful" to "care," transforming the verb into an adjective describing someone who is full of care; and "invent" does not contain a prefix but rather a root word that stands alone. These distinctions help clarify the function of prefixes in the language.

Metonymy is a figure of speech in which one word or phrase is substituted for another with which it is closely associated. In the phrase "All hands on deck," the term "hands" does not refer to the literal body parts but rather to the sailors or crew members who are available to help with the tasks on a ship. This use of "hands" represents the people who possess those hands, illustrating how metonymy operates by using part of something to signify the whole. The other phrases provided showcase different figures of speech. For instance, "The pen is mightier than the sword" illustrates the contrast between written words (represented by the pen) and military force (represented by the sword), but this is more of a symbolic comparison rather than metonymy. "Let me give you a hand" suggests assistance or help but uses "hand" in a more idiomatic sense rather than as a stand-in for people. "A swelling of pride" conveys an emotion but does not fit the definition of metonymy because it does not involve a substitutive relationship based on an association. Each of these alternatives serves distinct purposes in language, but "All hands on deck" distinctly exemplifies the metonymic use by representing the crew with

Similarly, a synonym for a prefix does not pertain to the concept of root words and suggests confusion between different morphemes that compose words.

Literature reviews compile and assess previously published research to present an overview of a field or topic without introducing new research, making them secondary sources. Thus, autobiographies stand out as the correct choice for primary research due to their firsthand nature.
