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Explanations

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1. Why are the Great Lakes important to Michigan economically and environmentally?

- A. Freshwater resources, shipping routes, tourism, fishing, and support for manufacturing.

These lakes are a vital resource for Michigan, supporting both the economy and the environment. They provide abundant freshwater used by homes, farms, and factories, helping keep costs down and backing industrial activity. They also function as major shipping routes, enabling goods to move efficiently to national and international markets, which sustains jobs in ports, transportation, and manufacturing-related industries. The lakes attract tourists and recreation-based business—boating, fishing, beaches, and resorts—boosting local economies across many communities. Fishing industries, both commercial and recreational, rely on healthy water and habitat, contributing to livelihoods and regional economies. Environmentally, the lakes offer critical habitats for wildlife, help maintain water quality, support biodiversity, and contribute to climate regulation and flood management. The option that includes freshwater resources, shipping routes, tourism, fishing, and support for manufacturing best captures these interconnected economic and environmental roles. Choices that focus on only tourism, only hydroelectric power, or claim little impact miss the broad, intertwined value the Great Lakes provide.

In a federal system, the authority to run elections is given mainly to state governments, with local offices handling much of the on-the-ground work. States establish who can vote, how people register, where polling places are, and how ballots are counted. The federal government sets broad protections and can provide funding, but it does not run elections nationwide. Private companies don't conduct public elections either. So the typical conduct of elections is carried out by states (often through their local election offices).

Equality is the idea that all people are treated the same and valued equally, providing the same rights and opportunities for everyone. This means no one is unfairly favored or excluded because of who they are. In practice, equality supports equal access to education, voting rights, and protections under the law. Justice is about fairness and may require different treatment to achieve fairness; the rule of law means laws apply to everyone equally, but equality specifically refers to equal status and value. Patriotism is about love for one's country. So, the term that best fits a situation where all people are treated the same and valued equally is equality.

The amendment that prohibits denying the right to vote based on race is the Fifteenth Amendment. Ratified in 1870 during Reconstruction, it declares that the right to vote shall not be denied or abridged because of race, color, or previous condition of servitude. This was aimed at protecting African American men after the Civil War and ensuring their access to the ballot. In practice, barriers still appeared for many decades, as states found methods like literacy tests or poll taxes to circumvent the protection. Later federal legislation and court rulings in the Civil Rights era helped remove many of these obstacles. Other amendments address different issues: one abolished slavery, another defined citizenship and equal protection under the law, and another deals with taxation.

Rail infrastructure grows where people, industry, and trade create a strong demand to move goods and people. The North developed the densest and most extensive network because it concentrated many early factories, large cities, and access to coal and multiple ports. That combination meant more railroad miles, more tracks, and more connections than other regions, placing it ahead in overall railroad infrastructure. The Gulf Coast focused more on ports and agriculture with fewer miles of track overall, the Atlantic Coast's lines were significant but not as extensive as the North's, and the Midwest expanded rapidly too, but the North's industrial concentration and population density gave it the edge in total railroad infrastructure.

The Northwest Ordinance shows how new lands would join the United States as part of the union rather than becoming separate, uncontrolled territories. It set a clear path from governed territory to full statehood: a governor, secretary, and judges would administer the area until enough people lived there, then residents could elect a legislature; once the population reached about 60,000, they could draft a constitution and apply to become a state with the same status as existing states. A crucial part of the ordinance is its prohibition of slavery in the Northwest Territory. That restriction shaped how the region would develop and became a significant symbol in the broader national debate over slavery as the country expanded westward. Its lasting significance lies in establishing a precedent for expansion that kept the United States whole and orderly. It guaranteed that new states would enter the Union on an equal footing, with a structured process for governance and a framework that aimed to protect basic rights within new territories.

The main idea is that federal law wins when it conflicts with state law. The Supremacy Clause makes the Constitution, federal statutes, and treaties the supreme law of the land. So, if a state law clashes with a valid federal law, the state law is overridden to the extent of the conflict. This principle, known as preemption, helps keep nationwide standards consistent in areas where Congress has authority. Courts handle the details of applying preemption to specific cases, but the overall rule is that federal law prevails.

The United States blends two ideas: democracy and a republic. Democracy shows up because citizens participate in elections to choose their leaders and have a voice in government through voting, giving people a say in who makes decisions. A republic shows up because those decisions are made by elected representatives who govern on the people's behalf, guided by a written constitution. This combination matters: voters elect members of Congress and the president, and those officials create laws and policies. At the same time, they must work within constitutional limits and are checked by other branches, protecting minority rights and preventing any single group from wielding unchecked power. In practice, most decisions are made by representatives rather than by direct, every-issue voting by the entire public, though many states also allow some direct citizen input on particular questions. The other choices conflict with how the system actually works. Direct plebiscites would place most authority in direct popular vote, bypassing representative governance. There are elected representatives, not a system with no representatives, and there's no single Supreme Council guiding all decisions.

9. Which religion is characterized by belief in reincarnation and many forms of the divine, originated in India?

Reincarnation and a wide variety of divine forms are telling clues here. Hinduism teaches samsara, the cycle of rebirth, guided by karma, and seeks moksha—liberation from that cycle. It also embraces many deities and manifestations of the one ultimate reality, Brahman, expressed in countless forms. This combination—rebirth as a core belief, and a pluralistic view of the divine rooted in India—fits Hinduism most clearly. Islam centers on worship of one God and began in Arabia, not in India. Christianity centers on Jesus and the belief in one God with origins in Judea/Palestine. Buddhism, which began in India, focuses on the path to enlightenment and suffering's cessation, and while it engages with various beings in some traditions, it does not center on belief in many gods in the same way Hinduism does.

Coordinating defense and security among Western nations is what NATO does. NATO, the North Atlantic Treaty Organization, is a military alliance built to align defense planning, share military capabilities, and conduct joint exercises among member countries. Its core idea is collective defense—if one member is attacked, others come to its aid—underlining cooperation across Western states. This focus distinguishes NATO from the United Nations, which works on global peace and security more broadly; the European Union, which handles regional policy and defense cooperation in its own framework but often relies on NATO for collective defense; and UNICEF, which is a United Nations agency devoted to children's welfare rather than military security.
