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Explanations

Smart and responsible use of technology is described by digital citizenship. This concept covers how people engage online with safety, ethics, and critical thinking—protecting personal information, evaluating the credibility of online sources, communicating respectfully, and understanding the impact of one's digital footprint. In classrooms and daily life, digital citizenship guides how we use devices, social media, and other digital tools to participate thoughtfully and responsibly. Diversity, metacognition, and qualitative don't fit this specific idea. Diversity focuses on differences among people; metacognition is about thinking about one's own thinking processes; qualitative pertains to a type of data or research method rather than responsible technology use.

Rhyme schemes refer to the arrangement of rhymes at the ends of lines. Poets map the pattern with letters for each line's ending sound, producing patterns like ABAB or AABB. This structure gives poetry a sense of musicality and predictability as the poem unfolds. Meter, on the other hand, is about rhythm formed by stressed and unstressed syllables in each line, not where the rhymes occur. Free verse describes poetry without a regular rhyme or meter. Genre is the broad category of a work, such as poetry vs. fiction, and doesn't describe end rhymes. So the term that best fits is rhyme schemes.

Fluent reading means more than just getting the words right. It combines accurate decoding with prosody—reading with appropriate expression, rhythm, and pacing. When a reader uses natural intonation, pauses at punctuation, and varying emphasis to reflect meaning and sentence structure, the text becomes easier to understand and more engaging. This expressive delivery helps convey questions, statements, and emotions, and it cues the listener to important ideas. Vocabulary helps with understanding, and knowing punctuation guides how we pause and intone, but the key aspect of fluency is the expressive, rhythmic way the text is read. Decoding speed alone doesn't ensure fluency—it's possible to read quickly without sounding natural.

Inference is drawing conclusions from clues and evidence in the text. When you notice hints, foreshadowing, or changes in a character's situation earlier on, you connect those pieces to predict that trouble will come later. This isn't just restating what happened (paraphrase), nor is it combining information from multiple sources (synthesize), and it isn't about the story's emotional atmosphere (mood). The clues lead you to anticipate what might occur, which is the essence of inference.

5. What does phonics study?

Phonics looks at how letters map to sounds and how we blend those sounds to read printed words. It teaches decoding: when you see a letter or letter pattern, you know its sound and can put the sounds together to pronounce the word. For example, the letters c-a-t map to /k/ /æ/ /t/ to read "cat." This is different from grammar rules that govern sentence structure, from understanding a word's meaning from context, or from analyzing how authors develop characters in a story. The focus is the relationship between letters and sounds used to decode printed words.

Stage directions are the cues in a script that tell actors and directors how to perform: when to enter or exit, where to move, what emotion to show, and how to deliver lines. They guide blocking, pacing, and stage business so the performance matches what the playwright intends. For example, directions like [enters from stage left], [pause], or [whispered aside to the audience] show exactly how the action and delivery should unfold. That's why this term best fits describing the cues that guide line delivery and actions on stage. The other terms refer to different aspects: a soliloquy is a character's solo speech revealing inner thoughts; verse is a form of poetry or meter used in the dialogue; theme is the underlying message or idea of the work.

Literature is the term for a collection of written works. It refers to the entire body of writings produced by a language or culture—novels, essays, plays, poems—treated as a whole. That makes it the best fit for describing a collection of written material. The other terms point to narrower ideas: genre is a way to categorize different kinds of writing, poetry is a specific form of writing, and meter is the rhythmic pattern used in poetry. So literature captures the idea of all the written works together.

Phonemic awareness is the ability to hear and manipulate individual sounds in spoken language. It involves noticing and working with the sounds that make up words—things like isolating the first or last sound, blending sounds to form a word, or breaking a word into its separate sounds. This skill focuses on sounds you hear without any written letters, and it lays the groundwork for decoding and spelling later on. The description that fits this concept is about hearing and manipulating those individual sounds in spoken language. The other descriptions point to related but different skills: recognizing and manipulating sentence structure deals with syntax and grammar; linking sounds to letters for decoding refers to phonics; reading comprehension strategies involve understanding meaning from text, which comes after decoding.

Text-to-speech in literacy instruction centers on accessibility by turning written text into spoken words. This lets learners who struggle with decoding, have visual or print disabilities, or are English learners access the same material through listening, often while following along. Hearing the text helps with fluency—modeling proper pronunciation, rhythm, and expression—which supports comprehension by linking sounds to meaning. It also promotes independence and confidence, as students can engage with texts they may not read easily yet. It isn't a grammar-checking tool, and it doesn't aim to slow reading to increase difficulty. It simply provides an alternative way to access text, and can be paired with other supports like highlighting or guided practice. It doesn't generate new texts automatically.

Predicting as a comprehension strategy centers on looking ahead while you read. By using clues in the text and your prior knowledge, you forecast what might happen next or what the author will explain. This keeps you actively engaged, helps you set a reading purpose, and allows you to check your understanding as new details appear. It isn't about summarizing the whole text after you finish, copying phrases verbatim, or ignoring difficult parts. Those actions reflect different approaches or poor habits, whereas predicting specifically trains you to anticipate upcoming information to stay meaningfully connected to what you're reading.
