For instance, in English, a standard sentence structure follows a subject-verb-object format, which distinguishes it from other languages that may utilize different syntactic structures. While some of the other options touch on related aspects of language, they do not accurately describe syntax. Meaning derived from conversations is related to semantics, which focuses on meaning rather than structure. The structure of words and their meanings refers more to morphology and semantics, not specifically to how those words are arranged in sentences. Patterns in phonetic sounds pertain to phonetics and phonology rather than syntax, as they focus on the sounds of language rather than the arrangement of words into sentences.
