This method not only decreases the likelihood of the undesired behavior manifesting but also promotes the development of more appropriate, incompatible behaviors. Thus, the focus on rewarding behaviors that are not possible together serves to create a more conducive learning environment focused on positive behavior change. In contrast, the other methods described do not specifically target incompatible behaviors, nor do they emphasize the reinforcement aspect that DRI relies upon, making the chosen answer particularly effective in behavior management.

Finally, a focus on standardized testing indicates a high-stakes, uniform measurement of student ability, which is contrary to the informal, nuanced insights gained from observing students in everyday situations.
