1. Which pair are landmark milestones in the U.S. Civil Rights Movement?

The main idea here is identifying two milestones that truly shifted the U.S. Civil Rights Movement by changing both legal doctrine and everyday protections. A Supreme Court decision holding that segregated public schools are unconstitutional was a pivotal moment because it rejected the legal basis for separate education and sparked nationwide desegregation efforts, challenging the long-standing "separate but equal" standard. The other milestone is a broad federal law that bans discrimination based on race, color, religion, sex, or national origin in public accommodations and employment, with strong enforcement powers for the federal government. Together, these two events mark a major turning point: a judicial ruling that dismantled legalized segregation and a federal statute that codified protections and enforcement, pushing civil rights into everyday life nationwide. The other options blend unrelated eras or topics, so they don't reflect this decisive shift in both judicial precedent and federal policy.

The main idea these voyages illustrate is the search for a Northwest Passage to Asia. European explorers of this era pursued a direct sea route to Asian markets to shorten trade routes and gain economic advantage. Jacques Cartier hoped to find a western passage through North America to reach Asia and expand French trade and claims, while Henry Hudson sought the same kind of route for English and Dutch interests. They did gather geographic and Indigenous knowledge along the way, but the driving objective was finding that water route to Asia for profitable trade. The other possibilities reflect secondary aspects, not the primary goal of these explorations.

3. Earthquakes are most likely to occur in regions where?

The main idea is that earthquakes happen where the Earth's tectonic plates interact and stress builds up until it is released as shaking. At convergent boundaries, plates push toward each other and collide or one plate dives beneath another. This interaction creates a lot of friction and locking, so rocks deform and store up energy for long periods. When they finally break and snap back, energy is released as an earthquake. That concentrated activity at convergent boundaries explains why earthquakes are most likely there. The other scenarios aren't as reliable indicators. Regions at plate boundaries can be seismically active, but the key factor is the movement toward or past each other, with convergence being a prime driver of frequent, powerful earthquakes. Long-term stability implies less stress buildup, and crustal thickness alone doesn't determine earthquake occurrence.

Focusing on where a document comes from, why it was created, and who it was meant to reach is the skill of sourcing. This approach helps you judge reliability by revealing the creator's perspective, motives, and potential biases—factors that shape how information is presented. For example, a government press release during a war is produced to persuade and mobilize support, so it may emphasize certain facts and omit others, which affects how trustworthy it is as a stand-alone factual source. Contextualization would place the document in a broader setting, corroboration would compare multiple sources for agreement, and close reading would analyze the language and rhetoric within the text.

Focusing on how the material used in textiles drives big changes helps explain why cotton becomes central. Cotton fibers respond very well to the new machine-driven methods that powered early factories—the spinning and weaving processes could produce large quantities of fabric quickly and at lower costs. A steady flow of raw cotton from colonies kept prices accessible, so cotton textiles could reach a mass market, unlike silk which was mainly luxury goods. Linen and wool, while important historically, didn't scale with the same combination of affordability and machine suitability that cotton offered in the early Industrial Revolution. This combination of abundant supply, lower cost, and strong compatibility with mechanized production explains why cotton dominated the textile industry during that era.

6. In Athenian democracy during the Age of Pericles, which statement best reflects citizens' role?

In Periclean Athens, the defining idea was that citizens should take an active role in governing the city. Free male citizens could participate directly in the Assembly, where they debated and voted on laws and policies, while the Council of 500 prepared the daily agenda. Public offices were often assigned by lot, signaling that any citizen could contribute to ruling the polis. This setup treats participation as a civic duty tied to citizenship, not just a personal preference. Of course, participation was limited to a subset of the population, since women, slaves, and non-citizens were excluded, but the core expectation was clear: citizens should be involved in public decision-making. There were no political parties driving government, and the duties of government extended beyond merely maintaining order to decisions on war, diplomacy, and broader public policy, reflecting a community-centered approach to governance rather than a focus on individual rights.

An isthmus is a narrow strip of land that connects two larger landmasses and separates two bodies of water. The option that describes a narrow strip of land connecting two larger lands fits this definition exactly. A fjord describes a long, narrow inlet of the sea with steep cliffs, not a land bridge. A strait or channel is a waterway connecting two bodies of water, not land. A delta is a low plain formed by mud deposits at a river's mouth. For example, the Isthmus of Panama links North and South America and separates the Pacific Ocean from the Caribbean Sea.

8. Which UN organ primarily handles international legal disputes between states?

The key idea is understanding which UN organ is built to resolve legal questions between states. The International Court of Justice is the primary judicial body of the United Nations; it settles disputes between states under international law, and it can issue binding judgments on those cases. It also provides advisory opinions to UN organs and specialized agencies when asked for legal guidance. In contrast, the General Assembly mostly makes recommendations on a wide range of political, economic, and social issues, and its resolutions are not binding. The Security Council handles matters of peace and security and can make binding decisions, but it does not function as a general court for interstate legal disputes. The Secretariat is the administrative arm of the UN and does not adjudicate legal disputes. So for international legal disputes between states, the International Court of Justice is the appropriate forum because it is designed to interpret and apply international law and to issue binding judgments on those disputes.

9. Which map projection is typically used to preserve area and often distorts shape?

Preserving area means every region on the map represents its true share of the Earth's surface. The Peters projection is an equal-area map, so it keeps the sizes of landmasses proportional to reality, but to do that it distorts shapes—landmasses can look stretched or squashed, especially toward the poles. This trade-off is exactly what makes it useful when the goal is to compare how much land there is in different regions rather than how their outlines look. Other projections emphasize different things: Mercator keeps angles and shapes locally which is great for navigation but greatly inflates areas near the poles; Gnomonic focuses on straight-line paths for great circles and isn't about area; Robinson aims for a balanced compromise rather than preserving area. So the projection that preserves area and often distorts shape is the Peters projection.

Manifest Destiny captures the unfoldment of expansion as a national mission. It framed the United States as destined to spread democracy, liberty, and American institutions across the continent, which helped drive westward settlement and the acquisition of vast tracts of land—think of the annexation of Texas, the Oregon path to settlement, and the Mexican-American War that produced the Mexican Cession, eventually bringing California and much of the Southwest into the United States. This era created a more connected and cohesive continental nation through territorial growth absorbed into American governance. Later imperialism shows a continuation of the same impulse to expand influence, but on a global scale. Instead of settling lands within a continental border, the United States extended power overseas through acquisitions and colonial arrangements—territories like Puerto Rico, Guam, and the Philippines, as well as strategic holdings and influence in places such as Hawaii and parts of China. The underlying idea—expanding American influence to secure economic and strategic interests—continues, but the methods shift from settling and organizing new lands within the continent to governing distant territories and projecting power abroad. Choices that describe noninterventionist policies, isolationism, or economic protectionism don't fit this pattern, as Manifest Destiny and subsequent imperialism were about outward expansion and influence rather than staying apart from global affairs or merely protecting domestic markets.
