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Explanations

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1. What is a key feature of aerial surveillance conducted from public airways?

Aerial surveillance conducted from public airways is not considered a search under the Fourth Amendment. This is primarily because when flying at a certain altitude, law enforcement is operating in a space where they are legally allowed to be, and they are only observing what is visible from that location. As for surgical anesthesia, Acepromazine does not provide the depth of anesthesia required for surgical procedures, as it does not induce the levels of unconsciousness necessary for such interventions. Thus, it is primarily recognized for its tranquilizing and sedative properties.
