For example, some choices may include drugs that are recognized for medical use or are classified under different schedules, thus failing to adhere to the definition necessary to be remembered with a schedule I mnemonic.

Therefore, the correct answer highlights the unique characteristic of live vaccines in preventing diseases like cholera.*
