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Explanations

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1. Turnaround time for Panorama testing is typically 5-7 days.

Turnaround time for Panorama testing reflects the time from when the sample arrives at the lab to when the final report is issued. After collection, the blood is shipped to a CLIA-certified lab where cfDNA is extracted, libraries are prepared, sequencing is performed, data are analyzed, and the report is generated. This multi-step workflow generally takes several business days, so the typical window is five to seven days. While faster processing or rush options may exist in some scenarios, the standard timeframe remains around five to seven days. The shorter ranges don't usually allow enough time to complete all steps reliably, and longer ranges exceed the common processing window used in most routine clinical workflows.

Triploidy means three complete sets of chromosomes, i.e., three copies of each chromosome ($3n$). In humans this would total 69 chromosomes instead of the normal 46. This is a form of polyploidy, distinct from having four copies (tetraploidy), two copies (normal diploidy), or one copy (haploidy) of each chromosome. So the description of three copies of each chromosome is the correct definition.

Panorama's standard report focuses on the chromosomal changes that cfDNA testing detects most reliably: trisomies 21, 18, and 13, together with the most common sex chromosome aneuploidies. This scope reflects what the test can consistently identify in maternal blood for a typical pregnancy. Microdeletions are not part of the standard report (they're offered as a separate panel). Neural tube defects aren't included because this cfDNA test isn't designed to detect them. Also, not all trisomies are reported in the standard panel—trisomies such as 16 and 22 aren't part of it due to limited clinical utility and interpretive challenges. Therefore, the standard Panorama report includes trisomies 21, 18, and 13 plus common sex chromosome aneuploidies.

They provide objective measurements of performance, especially sensitivity (how often the test correctly identifies true positives) and specificity (how often it correctly identifies true negatives), often along with other metrics like predictive values and confidence intervals. These papers describe study design, populations, reference standards, and thresholds so clinicians can trust the results and regulators can evaluate the test. Marketing plans, testimonials, or manufacturing process details do not assess diagnostic accuracy, so they don't describe how well the test actually works.

Panorama Microdeletions is designed to screen for a curated set of microdeletion regions that are clinically meaningful. Instead of scanning the entire genome for any possible deletion, this option targets a predefined panel of specific loci known to be associated with recognizable syndromes. This targeted approach gives more reliable, interpretable results for those well-established regions, rather than attempting a genome-wide search which can introduce more complexity and uncertainty. The other concepts—testing the whole genome, performing no microdeletion analysis, or choosing random regions for each patient—do not describe how Panorama Microdeletions is structured.

Cell free DNA consists of short DNA fragments that circulate freely in the plasma portion of blood, not inside cells. In pregnancy testing, the fetal component of cfDNA is found in plasma because it remains as cell-free fragments in the liquid part after centrifugation. Serum is formed after blood clots, and the clotting process can release DNA from cells, which can contaminate the sample and obscure the fetal signal. Plasma is collected with an anticoagulant and then spun down to remove cells, providing a cleaner source of true cell-free DNA. The cellular fraction contains intact cells with genomic DNA, not the freely circulating fragments used for cfDNA analysis. Platelet-rich plasma is a different preparation and is not used as the source for cfDNA testing.

Amniocentesis targets fetal cells suspended in the amniotic fluid. The procedure withdraws a small amount of this fluid, which contains cells shed from the fetus, and those cells are then used for diagnostic tests such as chromosomal analysis or genetic testing. This distinguishes it from chorionic villus sampling, which uses placental tissue; maternal blood tests, which rely on cell-free fetal DNA in the mother's blood; and cordocentesis, which samples fetal blood from the umbilical cord.

The main idea here is how pre-analytic handling preserves the integrity of cell-free DNA for Panorama. The test relies on analyzing fragmented cfDNA in plasma, so keeping the sample from degrading and from accumulating excess maternal DNA is essential. Using a proper blood draw combined with cfDNA stabilization tubes protects cfDNA from degradation and leukocyte lysis. Then, separating plasma promptly after collection prevents cellular DNA from contaminating the cfDNA pool, and storing and shipping under correct conditions preserves the cfDNA until analysis. This sequence—careful collection, stabilization, timely plasma separation, and appropriate storage/shipping—directly supports accurate results. Delaying plasma separation, using standard handling without stabilization, or storing for prolonged periods before processing all increase cellular DNA contamination or cfDNA degradation, which degrades sample quality and can compromise the test.

Cell-free DNA in pregnancy refers to small fragments of DNA circulating in maternal plasma that originate largely from placental trophoblasts. These fetal-origin fragments carry the fetal genome and are typically short, about 150–200 base pairs, produced mainly by placental cell turnover. Because they spill into the mother's bloodstream, we can analyze them noninvasively to screen for fetal chromosomal conditions. The primary source is the placenta, not maternal leukocytes, and these are DNA fragments (not RNA). They do circulate in maternal blood rather than being confined to the placenta.

Having three copies of chromosome 18 causes trisomy 18, which is known as Edwards syndrome. The term trisomy 18 describes three copies of that chromosome, and Edwards syndrome is the clinical name for this condition. The other well-known trisomies are Down syndrome from trisomy 21 and Patau syndrome from trisomy 13, which involve different chromosomes, not chromosome 18.
