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Explanations

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1. Which statement best describes the purpose of including a Bill of Rights?

- A. To delineate trade agreements
- B. To protect individual liberties and limit government power**

The main idea is that the Bill of Rights protects individual liberties and limits government power. It lays out fundamental rights—such as freedom of speech, religion, and assembly, plus due process and protections against unreasonable searches or cruel punishment—that the government must respect. This set of protections grew out of fears that a strong national government could infringe on personal freedoms, so it was added to constrain governmental power and safeguard basic human rights. Unlike options that focus on economics, military spending, or creating a state church, the Bill of Rights centers on ensuring individuals have recognized, protected freedoms and that the government cannot overstep its authority.

In 1774, the colonies expressed their case against British rule by a formal statement from the First Continental Congress. This document, the Declaration of Resolves of the First Continental Congress, asserts that the colonists are entitled to the rights of Englishmen and lists the ways Parliament and the crown had violated those rights. It spells out specific grievances and then calls for united colonial action, including boycott-like measures such as nonimportation, to pressure Britain to address those grievances. This makes it the right fit because it directly combines both a recitation of rights and a detailed listing of grievances, produced as a collective colonial response. Other options don't fit the timeframe or purpose. The Declaration of Independence, written in 1776, proclaims independence from Britain and lays out why, rather than focusing on declared rights and grievances from 1774. The Articles of Confederation, ratified later, establish a new system of government rather than a statement of grievances. The Treaty of Paris ends the war and recognizes peace, not a colonial protest or rights statement.

The key idea here is that the presidential race in 1876 became notorious because several states submitted competing sets of electoral votes, creating a dispute over who actually won the presidency. Samuel J. Tilden won the popular vote and had more electoral votes at first, but contested results in Florida, Louisiana, and South Carolina meant the final tally could not be decided by the usual process. To resolve this, a bipartisan Electoral Commission was formed and ultimately awarded the disputed votes to Rutherford B. Hayes, giving him the presidency. This outcome was formalized through the Compromise of 1877, which also led to the end of Reconstruction in the South. So, Rutherford B. Hayes is the figure associated with that famous contested election.

Equality before the law means that every person has the same natural rights and should receive the same protections and fair treatment by the legal system. Natural rights are universal, so the government must apply laws impartially to all people, not giving some special status or exemptions. When we talk about "treatment under the law," we're pointing to equal protection and non-discrimination in how laws are applied and how people are prosecuted or judged. Civil liberties refer to specific freedoms (like speech or worship); they don't by themselves express that everyone has the same rights in every situation. Due process focuses on fair procedures in legal cases, which is part of equal treatment but describes a specific rule rather than the broader claim. Rights of citizens limit who can enjoy certain protections, which excludes non-citizens and thus doesn't capture universal equality. So this concept—equality—best expresses the idea that all individuals have the same claim as human beings to natural rights and fair treatment under the law.

The idea being tested is how ownership of productive resources is organized in a society. The best answer describes a system where the community or the state owns or tightly controls the major means of production and how goods are distributed, aiming to share wealth more evenly and meet people's needs rather than maximize profits. In socialism, key industries can be owned or regulated by the public sector or by worker cooperatives, and decisions about what to produce and how to distribute goods are guided by social welfare goals rather than market forces alone. This differs from political systems that focus mainly on how governments are elected or laws made, and it also differs from communism, which envisions even more extensive collective ownership and a radically different economic arrangement. So this option best fits the idea of collective ownership and control over production and distribution at a societal level.

7. Which rights are protected by the First Amendment?

The main idea being tested is the set of protections the First Amendment provides. It safeguards five fundamental freedoms: religion, speech, press, assembly, and petition. This combination is what the First Amendment guarantees, so naming all five together shows exactly what it protects. In practice, religious freedom means you can choose your faith or practice no religion at all; speech lets you express ideas and opinions; the press can report news and information; assembly allows people to gather peacefully; and petition gives you a way to ask the government to address your concerns or to change laws. Other choices line up with rights from different amendments. The right to bear arms is a Second Amendment protection; protection against unreasonable searches is a Fourth Amendment issue; and cruel and unusual punishment is addressed by the Eighth Amendment.

Religious freedom and how it applies when a business is involved is the idea being tested. *Burwell v. Hobby Lobby Stores, Inc.* looked at whether for-profit corporations can claim religious exemptions from a federal regulation under the Religious Freedom Restoration Act. The regulation in question was the contraception mandate of the Affordable Care Act, which required employers to provide certain birth-control coverage to employees. The Court said yes, under RFRA a closely held for-profit corporation can be exempt if enforcing the regulation would burden the owners' sincerely held religious beliefs. RFRA requires the government to show a compelling interest and use the least restrictive means when a law substantially burdens religious exercise. The majority found that applying the mandate to these corporations would impose a substantial burden on the owners' religious beliefs, and that RFRA allowed exemptions in such circumstances. In this sense, the decision recognizes a form of corporate religious rights, grounded in the ownership and beliefs of the people behind the corporation, rather than granting a broad, general religious status to the corporation itself. This case doesn't address other big questions about corporate power or personhood in general. It's specifically about religious freedom as it applies to federal regulation under RFRA and whether those exemptions can extend to certain businesses based on their owners' beliefs. Other listed cases focus on different issues altogether—*Marbury v. Madison* on judicial review, *Brown v. Board of Education* on desegregation and equal protection, *Roe v. Wade* on abortion rights—so they don't fit the question's focus.

10. What system distributes power between national and state governments?

Federalism is the system that distributes power between national and state governments. In a federal setup, authority is divided and shared so the central government handles national issues—like defense, foreign policy, and currency—while states manage regional concerns such as education, policing, and local services. Some powers are shared (concurrent), and the states have a say in how national laws are applied, helping balance national unity with local autonomy. This contrasts with other forms: a monarchy concentrates power in a king or queen, an autocracy concentrates power in one ruler, and confederalism places most or all power in the states with a weak central government, not a clear division of sovereignty between levels.
