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Explanations

This approach aligns with best practices in guardianship, where the focus is on person-centered care that upholds the dignity and rights of the individual while ensuring their safety and well-being. In contrast, other options, such as "extreme precautions," might suggest an overly cautious stance that could infringe on personal freedoms, while "legal actions" might imply a more adversarial relationship or intervention that isn't necessary in every situation. "Active supervision" could be too intrusive and may not be appropriate depending on the relationship and circumstances. Thus, "reasonable measures" strikes the right balance between protection and respect for personal choices.
