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Explanations

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1. Which General Order requires you to salute all officers and all colors and standards not cased?

- A. Tenth General Order**
- B. Sixth General Order**
- C. Fifth General Order**

The main idea here is military courtesy and how a sentry shows respect to authority and to the symbol of the nation. The General Order that requires you to salute all officers and all colors and standards not cased is the one that sets that standard greeting. Saluting is a formal sign of respect to commissioned officers and to the colors when they are displayed and not covered. Knowing when to salute—specifically, to salute the officers and the colors that are out and uncased—helps reinforce discipline and proper etiquette at the post. The other general orders cover tasks like posting, reporting irregularities, staying alert, and following orders, but they don't establish this particular saluting rule. So the rule you'd rely on for saluting officers and uncased colors is the general order that explicitly states that salute.

The role being tested is who holds the civilian leadership of the Department of the Navy. In this material, the person named as Secretary of the Navy is Mr. Emmert. That makes him the correct choice because the Secretary is the official who heads the department and is responsible for its policy, budget, and overall direction for the Navy and Marine Corps. The other names are not shown with that title in this context, so they don't fit as the Secretary here.

3. What is the rank corresponding to pay grade O-6 in the Navy?

In the Navy, pay grade O-6 corresponds to the rank Captain. The officer pay grades run from O-1 (Ensign) up to O-10 (Admiral), with the number increasing as rank and responsibility grow. O-6 sits above Commander (O-5) and below Rear Admiral Lower Half (O-7). Captains are senior officers who may command major ships or serve in high-level staff roles, and their insignia is four gold stripes. The other ranks listed map to different pay grades: Ensign is O-1, Lieutenant is O-3, and Rear Admiral Upper Half is O-8.

So the correct association is Rear Admiral Upper Half.

5. What is the E-4 rank in the Marine Corps?

Understanding Marine Corps enlisted pay grades and leadership roles, the E-4 level is Corporal. This is the first noncommissioned officer rank in the Marines, ahead of Lance Corporal (E-3) and behind Sergeant (E-5). It marks a shift to formal leadership responsibilities, typically supervising a small team and guiding training and discipline at the squad level. The rank progression goes Private (E-1), Private First Class (E-2), Lance Corporal (E-3), Corporal (E-4), Sergeant (E-5). So the E-4 designation corresponds to Corporal.

6. Which rank is E-9?

In the Navy, enlisted ranks are assigned by paygrades from E-1 up to E-9, with the highest enlisted paygrade being E-9. The rank that corresponds to E-9 is Master Chief Petty Officer, which sits above Senior Chief Petty Officer (E-8) and Chief Petty Officer (E-7). Petty Officer Fourth Class is an E-4 rank, well below E-9. So Master Chief Petty Officer is the correct answer because it represents the top enlisted paygrade in the standard progression. (Note: Master Chief Petty Officer of the Navy is a specific appointment at the same E-9 level.)

7. Which rank is E-8?

Enlisted pay grades in the Navy map to specific rank names, progressing in level from E-7 to E-9. At E-7 the rank is Chief Petty Officer; at E-8 the rank is Senior Chief Petty Officer; at E-9 the rank is Master Chief Petty Officer. Therefore, the pay grade E-8 corresponds to Senior Chief Petty Officer. The other options represent different grades: Chief Petty Officer is E-7, Master Chief Petty Officer is E-9, and Petty Officer First Class is E-4.

8. Which rank is O-8 in the Marine Corps?

In the Marine Corps, officer ranks are tied to pay grades and insignia. At pay grade O-8, the title is Major General, a two-star general officer. This rank sits above Brigadier General (one star, O-7) and below Lieutenant General (three stars, O-9) and General (four stars, O-10). The two-star insignia marks this level of senior leadership, often seen commanding large units such as divisions or serving in senior high-level staff roles.

9. Which General Order directs a guard to take charge of this post and all government property in view?

The main idea being tested is what a sentry's first duty statement requires: taking charge of the post and everything within sight. This General Order sets the guard's primary responsibility from the moment they assume duty, establishing accountability for the post and all government property in view. It clarifies that the guard's authority and responsibility begin at the post and extend to whatever the guard can observe, until properly relieved. This wording is why it's the best answer—the directive directly describes the guard's initial charge and stewardship of property seen from the post. Other General Orders cover different expectations—how to conduct yourself while on duty, what to report, and how to handle emergencies—rules that complement the core duty but do not define the act of taking charge of the post and its visible property.

10. Rear Admiral Lower Half corresponds to which pay grade?

A. O-7

Think in terms of rank-to-pay-grade mapping. In the Navy, flag officers span pay grades from O-7 to O-10. The title Rear Admiral is used for two ranks: lower half (one star) and upper half (two stars). Rear Admiral (lower half) corresponds to pay grade O-7, while Rear Admiral (upper half) is O-8. Other pay grades map to different ranks—Captain is O-6, Vice Admiral is O-9, and Admiral is O-10. So the pay grade for Rear Admiral Lower Half is O-7.
