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Explanations

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1. Which rank corresponds to O-10 in the Navy?

- A. Admiral**
- B. Vice Admiral
- C. Rear Admiral Upper Half
- D. Captain

In the Navy, officer ranks map to pay grades from O-1 to O-10, with higher numbers signaling higher ranks. The pay grade O-10 corresponds to Admiral, the four-star flag officer. This is higher than Captain (O-6), Rear Admiral Upper Half (O-8), and Vice Admiral (O-9). The only rank above O-10 is Fleet Admiral (O-11), used only in wartime history, not in normal peacetime service. So the rank for O-10 is Admiral.

2. What is the sum of interior angles of a pentagon?

- A. 600 degrees
- B. 540 degrees**
- C. 720 degrees
- D. 900 degrees

The main idea is that the interior angles of a polygon can be counted by dividing the shape into triangles. For a pentagon, draw diagonals from one vertex to the nonadjacent vertices, and you'll split the figure into three triangles. Since each triangle has interior angles summing to 180 degrees, the pentagon's total interior angle sum is $3 \times 180 = 540$ degrees. The general rule is $(n - 2) \times 180$ for an n -gon, so for a pentagon ($n = 5$) you get $(5 - 2) \times 180 = 540$ degrees. The other numbers would correspond to polygons with more sides (six sides give 720, seven sides 900), not a pentagon.

3. Solve for x: $3x - 5 = 2x + 9$.

- A. 14**
- B. 7
- C. -4
- D. 2

Solving a linear equation means isolating the variable by doing the same operation on both sides. Start by removing the x term on the right: subtract $2x$ from both sides, giving $x - 5 = 9$. Then undo the constant by adding 5 to both sides, yielding $x = 14$. Check by substitution: $3(14) - 5 = 42 - 5 = 37$ and $2(14) + 9 = 28 + 9 = 37$, which matches. The solution is $x = 14$.

4. For the reaction $2\text{H}_2 + \text{O}_2 \rightarrow 2\text{H}_2\text{O}$, if 4 moles H_2 and 3 moles O_2 react completely, how many moles of H_2O are formed?

- A. 2 moles
- B. 3 moles
- C. 5 moles
- D. 4 moles**

The main idea here is using the balanced equation to compare how much of each reactant is needed and what gets produced, which tells you the limiting reagent and how much product forms. From the equation, 2 moles of hydrogen react with 1 mole of oxygen to produce 2 moles of water. This gives a hydrogen-to-water relationship of 1:1 when you scale to the amounts involved (for every 2 H_2 that react, you get 2 H_2O). Check which reactant limits the reaction: if you use all four moles of hydrogen, you would need 2 moles of oxygen (because 2 H_2 require 1 O_2). You have 3 moles of oxygen, which is more than enough, so hydrogen is the limiting reactant. When the four moles of hydrogen are consumed, the same four moles of water are formed, since the reaction produces water in a 1:1 molar ratio with hydrogen under these conditions. So the amount of water formed is four moles.

5. Which rank represents pay grade O-7 in the Navy?

- A. Rear Admiral Lower Half**
- B. Rear Admiral Upper Half
- C. Captain
- D. Vice Admiral

In the Navy, officer pay grades run from O-1 to O-10. O-7 is the first flag rank, which is the one-star level known as Rear Admiral (Lower Half). This distinguishes it from the next flag rank, Rear Admiral (Upper Half), which is O-8 and has two stars. Captain is at O-6, and Vice Admiral is O-9. So the pay grade O-7 corresponds to Rear Admiral (Lower Half), the correct match.

6. What is the title for E-6?

- A. Petty Officer First Class**
- B. Petty Officer Second Class
- C. Petty Officer Third Class
- D. Chief Petty Officer

In the Navy's enlisted ranking system, pay grades run from E-1 to E-9, and each grade has a corresponding title. E-6 is Petty Officer First Class, placed above E-5 (Petty Officer Second Class) and below E-7 (Chief Petty Officer). This position reflects increasing leadership responsibilities and technical proficiency. A Petty Officer First Class often serves as a lead petty officer within a division, mentoring junior sailors, supervising work, and ensuring tasks are completed to standard. The common shorthand for this rank is PO1.

7. Find the next term in the sequence: 2, 6, 12, 20, 30, ...

- A. 28
- B. 56
- C. 72
- D. 42**

Each term comes from multiplying two consecutive integers, starting with 1×2 , then 2×3 , 3×4 , 4×5 , 5×6 . Following that pattern, the next is $6 \times 7 = 42$. Another way to see it is by looking at the differences: 4, 6, 8, 10 – these increase by 2 each time, so the next difference is 12, giving $30 + 12 = 42$. The next term is 42.

8. What is the E-8 rank (pay grade) in the Marine Corps?

- A. Master Sergeant/First Sergeant**
- B. Sergeant Major
- C. Master Gunnery Sergeant
- D. Sergeant

E-8 in the Marine Corps is held by two ranks: Master Sergeant and First Sergeant. After reaching Gunnery Sergeant at the E-7 level, Marines move up to E-8 by assuming one of these roles. They share the same pay grade, but have different duties: a Master Sergeant focuses on technical leadership and expertise within a specialty, while a First Sergeant serves as the senior enlisted adviser for a battalion or similar unit, handling welfare, discipline, and overall enlisted supervision. The other ranks listed map to different pay grades—Sergeant is E-5, and Master Gunnery Sergeant and Sergeant Major are E-9—so they are not E-8.

9. The 11th General Order emphasizes challenging all persons on or near your post. Which option reflects this directive?

- A. To challenge all persons on or near my post**
- B. To log all visitors
- C. To maintain silence
- D. To report only suspicious activity

The main idea here is actively verifying who is near your post to prevent unauthorized access. The 11th General Order directs you to challenge every person who comes near your post, establishing identity and purpose before anyone passes. The best choice states that you are to challenge all persons on or near your post, which directly reflects that proactive, protective duty. The other options describe related tasks—logging visitors, staying silent, or only reporting suspicious activity—but they don't capture the explicit requirement to challenge everyone who approaches, which is the core action this order calls for.

10. Which rank is immediately above Captain in the Marine Corps ladder?

- A. First Lieutenant
- B. Captain
- C. Major**
- D. Lieutenant Colonel

Understanding how Marine Corps officer ranks are ordered helps. The sequence goes Second Lieutenant, First Lieutenant, Captain, Major, Lieutenant Colonel, and so on. Captain is the third officer rank (O-3). The next rank up is Major (O-4), which is why Major sits directly above Captain. In terms of roles, a Captain typically commands a company, while a Major handles higher-level responsibilities, often at the battalion level or in staff roles, reflecting the shift to field-grade leadership. The other options are ranks that come either before Captain (First Lieutenant) or after Major (Lieutenant Colonel), so they aren't the immediate successor.
