Ray Mabus and Chuck Hagel were not Navy officers; Mabus was the Secretary of the Navy, and Hagel served as the Secretary of Defense. Thus, they were involved in leadership, but not in the military command role of CNO. The significance of the CNO position underscores the leadership structure within the Navy, and Jonathan Greenert's tenure shaped many operational policies impacting naval strategy during his time in that role.
