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Explanations

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1. Knights of Labor aimed to organize which groups and pursue which outcome?

A. A government agency regulating labor

Organizing all workers into one broad union and pursuing wide-ranging social reforms is what the Knights of Labor stood for. They built a single labor organization that welcomed both skilled and unskilled workers, including women and many minority workers, with a platform that went beyond wages to larger changes in society. Their goals included the eight-hour workday, the abolition of child labor, equal pay for equal work, safer workplaces, and the creation of worker cooperatives or public ownership of key industries. They also supported political reforms and mechanisms that would empower workers, not just immediate wage gains. This description fits best because it captures both their inclusive organizing approach and their expansive reform agenda. It isn't about creating a government agency regulating labor, nor is it a political party or a movement specifically aimed at ending strikes. They did use tactics like strikes and boycotts at times, but their overall aim was broader organization and social reform, not ending strikes.

The World Bank's main purpose is to finance development in poorer countries. It does this by providing loans and financial assistance for large-scale projects that help a country grow—things like roads, schools, hospitals, sanitation, and energy infrastructure—often with long repayment terms and favorable rates. In addition to loans, it offers technical advice and policy guidance to help governments implement and sustain these projects. This focus on funding development sets it apart from purely humanitarian aid, which is typically grants for immediate relief, and from military aid or trade regulation, which are handled by other entities. So, loans to developing nations best capture what the World Bank primarily does.

The Abbasid Caliphate fits this: it built a centralized, bureaucratic administration centered in Baghdad, managing a vast and diverse empire with organized provincial governance and record-keeping. This era also supported scientific and cultural flourishing. In 1258, the Mongols sacked Baghdad, ending the Abbasid political authority. The other options belong to different times or regions and were not toppled by the Mongols in the 13th century.

Where a people's homeland and sphere of influence lies helps explain their place in history. The Iroquois Confederacy, also known as the Haudenosaunee, formed in the northeastern woodlands and was centered in what is now upstate New York, with strong ties to the Great Lakes region and the St. Lawrence Valley. Their main towns and political center were in central New York, near Onondaga, and their influence extended through the surrounding Great Lakes area. This geographic home places them in the New York/Great Lakes region, not in the Southeast United States, the Pacific Northwest, or the Gulf Coast.

5. Vasco da Gama was the first European to reach India by sailing around the tip of Africa in which year?

The main idea is establishing a direct sea route from Europe to India by rounding Africa, which transformed global trade. Vasco da Gama sailed from Portugal in 1497, passed around the Cape of Good Hope by late 1497, and then continued to India, reaching Calicut in 1498. The year tied to the successful voyage around Africa that opened this route is 1497. That year marks the completion of the voyage around the southern tip of Africa and the opening of a direct path to India for European traders. The actual arrival in India happened a bit later, in 1498, but the pivotal voyage around Africa—and thus the first European link to India by sea—is associated with 1497.

6. Filial piety is best described as respect for which group?

Filial piety centers on honoring and caring for one's parents and ancestors. The best description is parents, because the term specifically refers to the duties a child owes to their immediate family, including showing respect, obedience, and support for aging parents and honoring the family lineage. While people often show respect to elders, rulers, or teachers in different contexts, filial piety is unique to the parent-child relationship and the obligations within the family. This value is a cornerstone of Confucian ethics and has historically guided family life and social harmony.

7. Which economist is associated with advocating government spending to help an economy during the Great Depression (New Deal)?

Key idea: active fiscal policy to boost demand during a deep economic slump. When private demand collapses, government spending can put people to work and raise incomes, which in turn spurs further spending in the economy. John Maynard Keynes argued that in downturns the government should step in with spending and, if needed, borrowing, because the resulting boost to aggregate demand has a multiplier effect on GDP and employment. The New Deal is often cited as an example of this approach in practice, with public works, relief programs, and reforms aimed at reviving demand and confidence. Other economists listed align with different views: Adam Smith favored limited government and free markets; Karl Marx critiqued capitalism and emphasized systemic change; Milton Friedman promoted monetarist ideas emphasizing price stability and smaller government.

8. What did the Sixteenth Amendment create?

The main idea is that this amendment gave Congress the power to collect a federal income tax directly from individuals without having to divide the revenue among states by population. Ratified in 1913, it clarified that taxes on income from any source could be imposed without apportionment, overcoming prior constitutional doubts and court rulings that had blocked a national income tax. This changed the federal government's funding, making the income tax the primary source of revenue and enabling a more modern, progressive tax system. To place it in context, other well-known amendments modified different areas: the right to a speedy trial comes from the Sixth Amendment, Prohibition from the Eighteenth Amendment, and the direct election of U.S. Senators from the Seventeenth Amendment.

At the heart of this item is the emergence of representative government in English America. In 1619, the Virginia colony established the House of Burgesses, a body of elected representatives from various towns who met in Jamestown to make laws and approve taxes. This was the first colonial assembly that gave settlers a voice in their own governance, setting a precedent for later colonial legislatures and for the idea that government should derive authority from the consent of the governed. Other colonies developed their own assemblies with different names and structures, but the House of Burgesses is specifically tied to Virginia as the first of its kind.

10. Which statement best reflects factors contributing to the decline of the Ottoman Empire?

This question focuses on why the Ottoman Empire weakened, highlighting how internal weaknesses paired with external pressure and slow modernization drove the decline. Internally, ongoing succession disputes and political fragmentation weakened central authority and stalled coherent reform. Externally, European powers chipped away at territory, exerted influence, and capitalized on military and economic leverage, while nationalist movements within the empire further eroded its borders. Reform efforts did occur to modernize the military, administration, and economy, but they were uneven and too slow to reverse the trend. So the combination of internal strife, external encroachment, and incomplete modernization best explains the decline.
