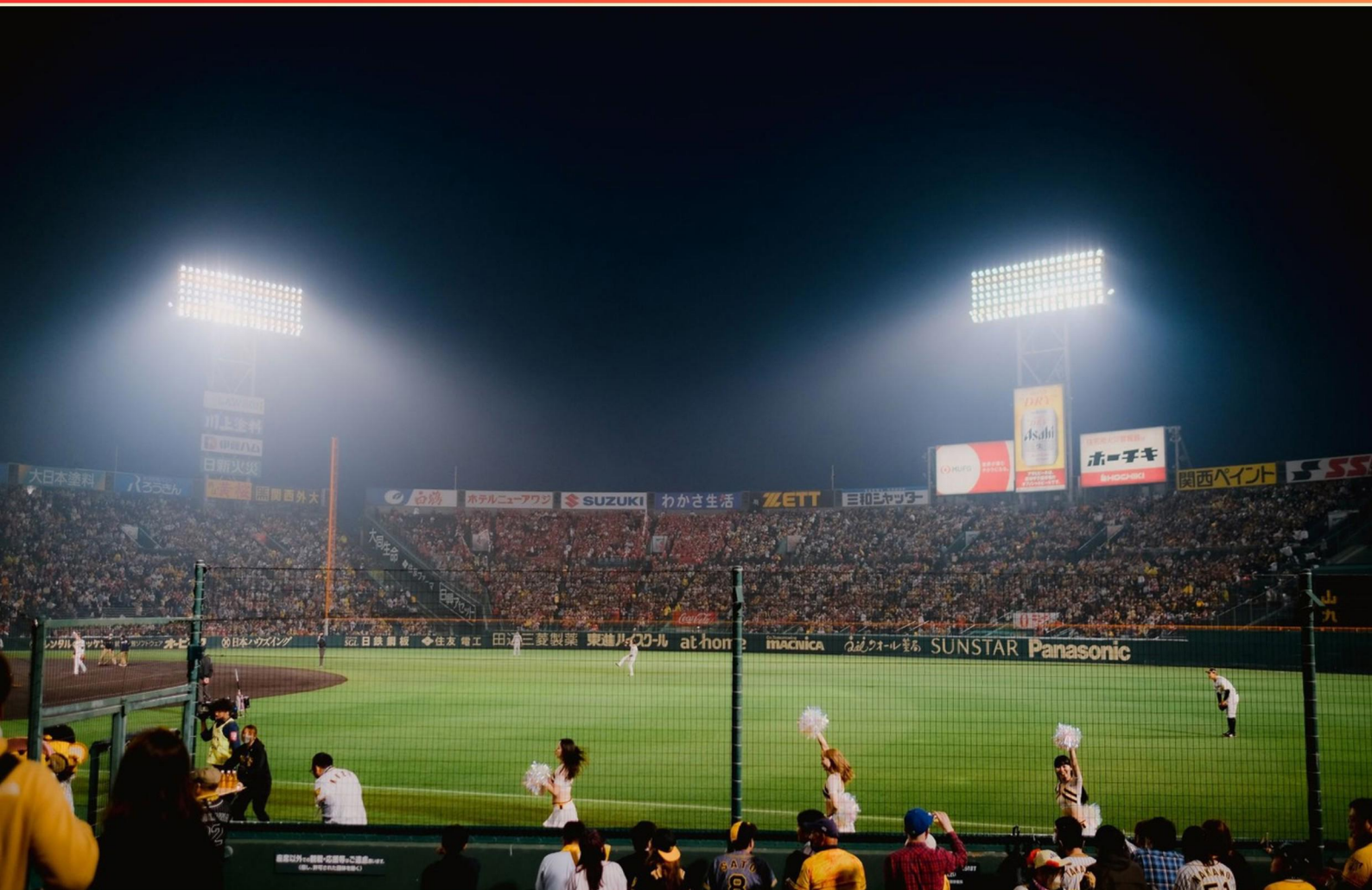

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Explanations

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1. How is the ball considered "live" during gameplay?

The ball is considered "live" in gameplay when it is pitched and arrives in the strike zone. This definition is fundamental to the flow of the game, as it establishes when the batter is able to make a decision to swing or not, and when fielders are able to make plays. This rule is designed to protect base runners from being unfairly affected by the pitcher's actions that disrupt the normal flow of play. Thus, when a balk is called, it's a clear move to maintain the integrity of the game by ensuring that base runners are not disadvantaged.
