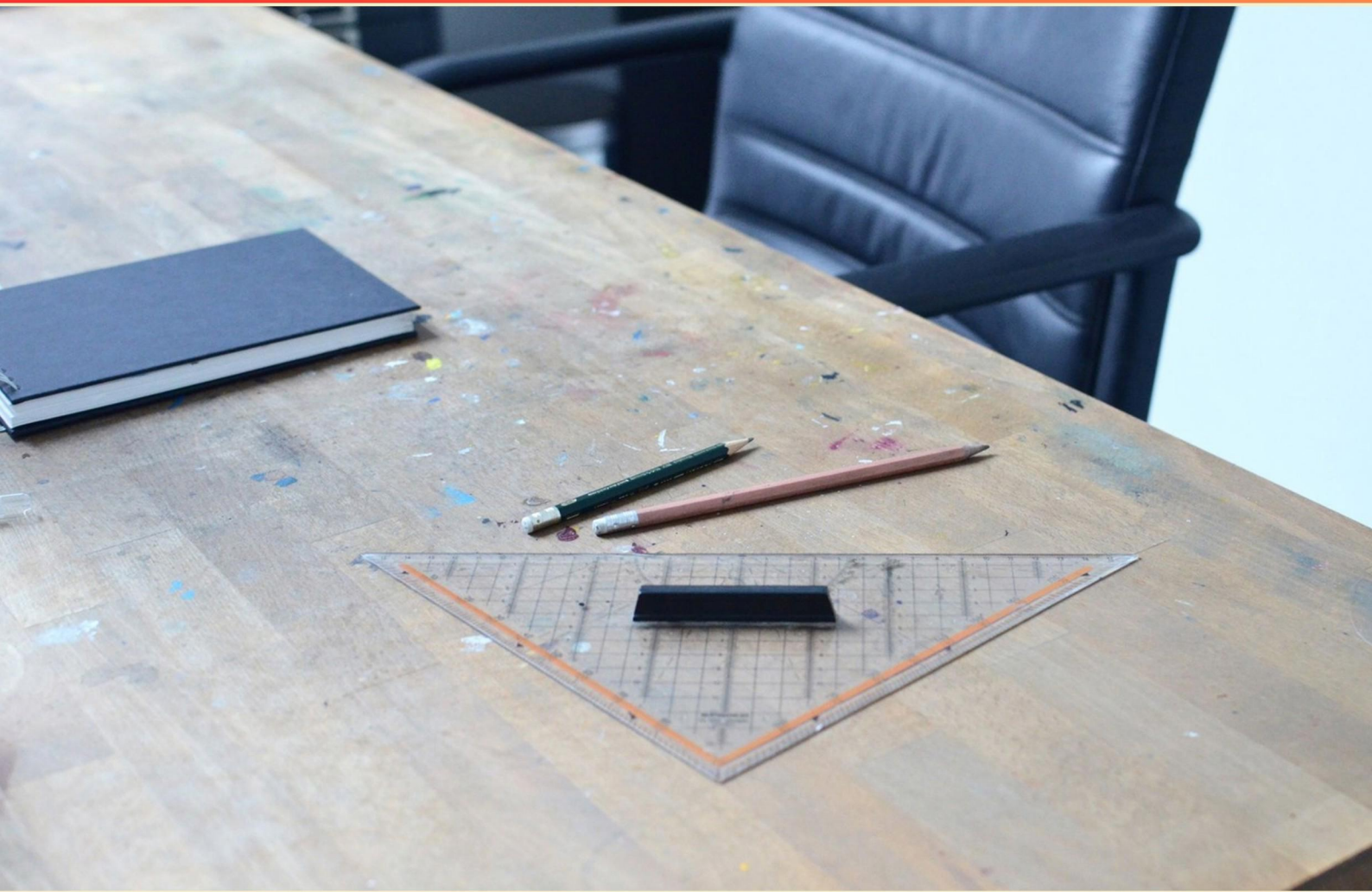

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Explanations

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1. Which artist is known for creating public, unsanctioned street art and works such as Murals?

- A. Banksy**

Banksy stands out because his art is created in public spaces without permission, using stencils to produce large murals on city walls that turn ordinary surfaces into social and political commentary. This unsanctioned, mural-based street art identity is what he's best known for, setting him apart from artists who primarily work in galleries or on commissioned pieces. The other artists have different primary modes: Shepard Fairey is famous for street posters and graphic campaigns, including the Obey/Hope imagery, but his career spans both street and commercial work; Nam June Paik is a pioneer of video art and installations rather than street murals; Marina Abramović is renowned for performance art, focusing on endurance and audience interaction rather than public wall works.

The two main phases—analytic Cubism, which fragments subject matter into dense, muted planes, and synthetic Cubism, which adds recognizable elements through collage while keeping the multi-view approach—capture the idea of seeing from different angles simultaneously. Surrealism focuses on dream imagery and the subconscious, Realism aims for accurate everyday depiction, and Impressionism highlights light and fleeting moments with visible brushwork, none of which center on breaking forms into geometric shapes from multiple perspectives.

Bierstadt's work is defined by monumental, luminous landscapes that emphasize the vast, awe-inspiring scale of nature. The Rocky Mountains fits this pattern exactly, representing his famous large-scale Western landscape style. The other titles come from artists of different regions and periods—The Great Wave off Kanagawa is by Hokusai, The Last Supper by Leonardo da Vinci, and The Birth of Venus by Botticelli—so they don't reflect Bierstadt's signature subjects.

The idea here is understanding when Art Nouveau started making a mark in Paris and how that interest turned into commercial spaces. If you consider the other years, they don't align with the established pattern of the movement's rise in Paris—1890 is earlier in the spread, and 1900 is later—so 1895 is the most plausible and accurate opening year.

Edward Hopper's work centers on ordinary American settings—gas stations, diners, quiet interiors—portrayed with precise realism and a mood that reveals the inner life of modern Americans. This blend of choosing quintessential American subjects and conveying the emotional texture of those scenes aligns him with both strands of American Scene painting: the Regionalists in his focus on American life, and the Social Realists in his commitment to portraying real conditions of everyday existence. He isn't confined to one camp, but his subject matter and approach place him squarely within the broader American Scene movement, connecting him to both groups.

This approach creates softer, more lifelike figures that convey presence, volume, and emotion within a narrative scene. The fresco technique itself supports subtle tonal shifts that define form and place figures in believable space, reinforcing the sense of realism. The other descriptions describe flatter, more elongated, abstract, or highly stylized approaches that don't capture the naturalism Giotto introduced. So, the features shown are softer, more lifelike human forms with weight and roundness.

10. Which painting technique is associated with Georges Seurat, described as Bright Colors in tiny dots?

Pointillism is a painting technique that uses small dots of pure color placed next to each other. When you look from a distance, the eye blends those dots to create a full image with vibrant, luminous color. Georges Seurat is famous for developing this method, often described as bright colors in tiny dots, because the effect comes from optical mixing rather than heavy brushstrokes. Impressionism, by contrast, tends to show looser, quicker brushwork and focuses on capturing fleeting light and atmosphere, not dot patterns. Fauvism uses bold, wild color applied with expressive brushwork rather than precise dotting. Chiaroscuro is about the strong contrast of light and shadow to model form, not about color dots.
