The Babylonian Civilization is associated with the creation of Hammurabi's Code, one of the earliest and most comprehensive written legal codes in history. In contrast, the other choices do not encapsulate the primary religious importance of the Kaaba. While it may be a location of historical interest and receives tourists, its essence extends far beyond being merely a historical landmark or a site for

While Rousseau did recognize certain democratic principles, he did not equate democracy with the parliamentary systems of his time, instead favoring more direct forms of citizen involvement and communal decision-making.
