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Explanations

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1. Which term describes providing a therapeutic environment for the delivery of health care?

- A. Diagnostic Services

Providing a therapeutic environment for delivering health care is the role of Support Services. This area focuses on creating and maintaining the setting in which care happens—ensuring clean, safe facilities; keeping equipment available and functioning; coordinating dietary and transportation needs; and handling administrative tasks that support patient care. By taking care of these environmental and logistical factors, Support Services enable clinicians to focus on treatment and healing, making the care environment conducive to therapy. In contrast, Diagnostic Services are about identifying health issues through tests, and Therapeutic Services involve direct patient treatment.

The concept being tested is identifying the official instructions from the physician that guide all aspects of a patient's care. The complete set of physician orders represents every directive the physician authorizes for the patient—medications, treatments, diagnostics, activity restrictions, and consults—written to be carried out by the care team. This makes it the authoritative source for what should be done next and how care should proceed. This is different from a complete medication list, which only lists the drugs the patient is taking or has been ordered, not the entire plan of care. It's also different from the care plan, which outlines goals, interventions, and outcomes for the patient, often developed by the broader care team. And it's not the nursing schedule, which specifies when tasks will be performed rather than what is actually to be done as ordered by the physician.

Battery is the term for intentional physical contact that is harmful or offensive and occurs without the other person's consent. The key elements are that the touch is deliberate, it is unwanted or offensive to the person touched, and there is no valid permission to touch. This distinguishes it from assault, which centers on threatening or attempting harmful contact or causing fear of imminent harm, even if no actual contact occurs. Abusive behavior is a broader idea that can include various forms of harm, not specifically the unconsented physical touching defined here, and therapeutic services are unrelated to harming or touching in a harmful way. For example, punching someone or grabbing them without permission fits battery because it involves intentional, unwanted contact.

Protozoa are microscopic, single-celled organisms that behave like animals. They typically inhabit water or decaying materials and feed on other microorganisms or organic matter, moving by structures such as pseudopods, cilia, or flagella, which gives them an animal-like lifestyle. Bacteria are also tiny and single-celled but are prokaryotes, lacking the defined nucleus and complex cell structure protozoa have. Viruses aren't cells at all and need a host to reproduce, so they don't fit the idea of a living single cell. Fungi can be multicellular or, in some cases like yeasts, single-celled, but they are organized differently from protozoa and don't exhibit the same animal-like behavior. Because of these characteristics, the best term for these organisms is protozoa.

5. What term describes farther from the trunk of the body?

Distal describes something that is farther from where a limb attaches to the body. It's used to indicate positions along limbs relative to the trunk, with the farther end being distal. For example, the hand is distal to the elbow, and the toes are distal to the knee—the parts farther from the trunk. The opposite term is proximal, which describes something closer to the trunk. The other terms shown—superficial (near the surface), deep (farther from the surface), and inferior (lower in the body in an upright position)—don't relate to distance from the trunk, so they aren't correct here.

6. What care program focuses on reducing pain, symptoms, and stress during the last stage of terminal illnesses?

Focusing on comfort, symptom relief, and support at the very end of life is the hallmark of hospice care. Hospice is a care program designed for people with terminal illnesses when curative treatment is no longer pursued, with the goal of reducing pain, easing symptoms, and lowering stress for the patient. It also provides emotional, spiritual, and practical support for families, often through a team-based approach that can occur at home or in a facility and addresses physical, emotional, and social needs to improve quality of life during the final stage. The other terms relate to different concepts: privacy rules that protect health information, and an anatomical plane that divides the body horizontally. They don't describe a care program for terminally ill individuals.

Authority and responsibility in a facility are organized through a chain of command. This structure defines who has the power to make decisions, who reports to whom, and how information and instructions flow, creating clear lines of accountability. Keeping a defined chain of command helps everyone know where to go for approvals, who oversees tasks, and how to escalate issues, which is especially important in emergencies or when coordinating care. Patience describes a personal trait about staying calm under pressure, tact refers to communicating respectfully to avoid offense, and gender is unrelated to how authority is arranged. None of these establish a formal hierarchy like a chain of command.

When protecting against infections, you apply precautions that match how the infection spreads. Standard Precautions are the baseline practices used for all patients. But when you know or strongly suspect a particular infection, you add extra measures tailored to that infection's transmission. That framework is called Transmission-Based Isolation Precautions, and it covers the specific routes—airborne, droplet, or contact—so you choose the appropriate extra precautions based on how the pathogen is transmitted. For example, tuberculosis requires airborne precautions, influenza requires droplet precautions, and MRSA requires contact precautions. So the best choice is Transmission-Based Isolation Precautions because it guides the additional, infection-specific steps beyond standard care.

Standard Precautions are the set of CDC precautions used for the care of all patients, regardless of infection status. They combine Universal Precautions—treating blood and certain body fluids as potentially infectious—with Body Substance Isolation, which protects against exposure to all body substances. This approach means consistent hand hygiene, using the appropriate personal protective equipment (gloves, gowns, masks, eye protection) based on the task, safe handling of needles and sharps, proper cleaning and disinfection of equipment, and respiratory hygiene. Transmission-Based Precautions are added only when a patient is known or suspected to have a specific infectious disease, layering on top of Standard Precautions. Sanitization is about cleaning surfaces to reduce microbes, and antisepsis involves reducing pathogens on living tissue; neither term describes the universal, all-patient framework described here.

Sterilization is the process that completely destroys all microbial life, including spores. This level of elimination is achieved with methods like autoclaving (steam under pressure), dry heat, or chemical sterilants that are proven to inactivate spores and other hard-to-kill organisms. Other terms—disinfection, antisepsis, and sanitization—reduce or remove many microbes but do not guarantee the total destruction of spores, which is why they aren't the correct choice for this description.
