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Explanations

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1. What is the number for SAT?

To reach SAT, you want the direct desk line that matches the department's known campus number format. The line that ends with 3111 is the one designated for SAT, giving the full number 919-513-3111. The other endings connect to different offices or general lines, so they wouldn't put you through to SAT. When in doubt, verify with the official campus directory, but the direct SAT contact in this set is the 3111 extension.

2. What is the password for the safe?

Passwords for secure locations are typically six-character codes that avoid common words and follow an internal coding pattern rather than plain English. The code that starts with the expected prefix and ends with a non-dictionary suffix fits that style, making it a plausible internal password for the safe. Among the options, this six-letter code does not spell a recognizable word, aligning with the idea of a non-guessable, purpose-built code. The other options include a common English word, which would be considered weak and more easily guessed, or end with endings that don't match the established internal suffix pattern. That combination of length, non-word form, and alignment with the expected coding scheme makes it the best choice.

3. What are the family recreation hours on Saturdays?

On Saturdays, family recreation is scheduled to be open from 9 AM to 7 PM, giving a broad window that covers morning through early evening. This timing best fits how families typically plan weekend visits, letting someone come in for morning activities or stay for afternoon and early evening options. The other options narrow the window—starting later or ending earlier—so they would miss part of the day and aren't as flexible for weekend plans.

4. For a long-term power outage, what should you do?

In a long-term power outage, the priority is safety and security for people and the building. Closing the facility the way you would for a normal closing shift ensures everyone is accounted for, exits are controlled, and entrances are secured, reducing the risk of injury, theft, or damage. It also helps conserve any available backup power by not keeping nonessential areas energized, and it aligns with established emergency procedures so staff know the expected steps and reporting channels. If there is a formal plan to operate only certain essential functions on backup power, that should be followed under proper supervision and within the incident response framework. Opening all doors for ventilation is unsafe because you can't reliably control climate, airflow, or security without power, creating hazards and potential unauthorized access. Continuing operations with backup power is only appropriate if there is a documented, authorized plan and the facility can safely sustain those critical operations. Posting signs and staying open ignores occupancy, security, and safety needs during a long outage, which is not appropriate.

5. How many large Band-Aids are in the fanny pack?

Choosing a practical quantity of a common first-aid item for a small carry kit tests your ability to balance usefulness with space. In a fanny pack, you want enough large Band-Aids to handle typical minor injuries, but not so many that the pack becomes cramped or heavy. The best option picks up that balance: it provides enough coverage for common issues while keeping the pack compact and easy to grab. The other choices would be either insufficient for real-world needs or wasteful given the limited space: too few won't help with common minor injuries, while too many would crowd the pack and leave less room for other essentials.

When something urgent needs housekeeping after hours, the fastest and most reliable route is to contact the campus police. They are always staffed and serve as the after-hours liaison to on-call Facilities Operations crews. A dispatcher can quickly assess the situation and summon the appropriate housekeeping team, ensuring the issue is addressed promptly and safely, with the right access and safety precautions in place. emailing housekeeping after hours isn't immediate, and internal numbers like SAT aren't the established channel for emergencies. Waiting until business hours would delay cleanup and could create safety or property risks.

7. Which location is designated for supervisor use?

In facilities operations, settings that are explicitly marked for supervisor use are designated so a supervisor can access them quickly for oversight, coordination, or control during events or emergencies. The option outside Acquatics labeled for the supervisor is the one that clearly designates a space reserved for supervisory use, making it the appropriate choice. The other locations—connecting bridges, fire doors, or a general outside west area—are not specified as supervisor-only spaces and are part of standard routes or access points, not earmarked for supervisory tasks.

During an EQ alarm, the focus is on keeping evacuation routes open and allowing quick, safe movement of guests. This means making sure guests are not blocking sidewalks and roads, so people can reach exits without hindrance and emergency responders can move where needed. If sidewalks and roads stay clear, evacuations proceed smoothly, bottlenecks are avoided, and safe assembly areas can be reached more efficiently. Letting guests roam freely can lead to crowding and injuries. Directing guests to crowd entrances creates bottlenecks and can block exits, hindering evacuation. Ignoring guest movement is dangerous and contrary to safety procedures.

9. Which step involves placing gloves on during the spill-clean process?

Placing gloves on early in a spill-cleaning sequence establishes a protective barrier before you touch any contaminated material. The hands are the most likely route for skin exposure, so donning gloves right at the start prevents direct contact with the spill and helps prevent spreading contaminants to other surfaces or to yourself. Once the gloves are on, you can safely proceed with containment and cleanup actions, knowing your hands are protected. If gloves aren't put on at the beginning, you risk exposing the skin during initial contact with the spill and while moving materials or setting up containment, which undermines safety and increases the chance of cross-contamination. Other steps in the procedure typically involve planning, notifying others, or performing cleanup tasks, but they don't provide the same immediate protection as having gloves on before you begin handling the spill.

10. Which option is listed as a designated location related to safety infrastructure?

The concept here is recognizing locations that are part of the facility's safety infrastructure. West fire doors are a designated safety feature because fire doors are essential components of the building's life-safety system: they help compartmentalize spaces, slow the spread of fire and smoke, and provide a controlled, safe path for evacuation. They're typically identified on safety plans as designated points for emergency egress and access. The other options don't fit as safety-infrastructure designations: "outside main (FOR SUPERVISORS)" indicates a personnel area rather than a safety feature; "outside tennis courts" isn't a safety infrastructure designation; and "WRC-2 & WRC-3 Connecting bridges" are structural elements, not specifically labeled safety infrastructure locations.
