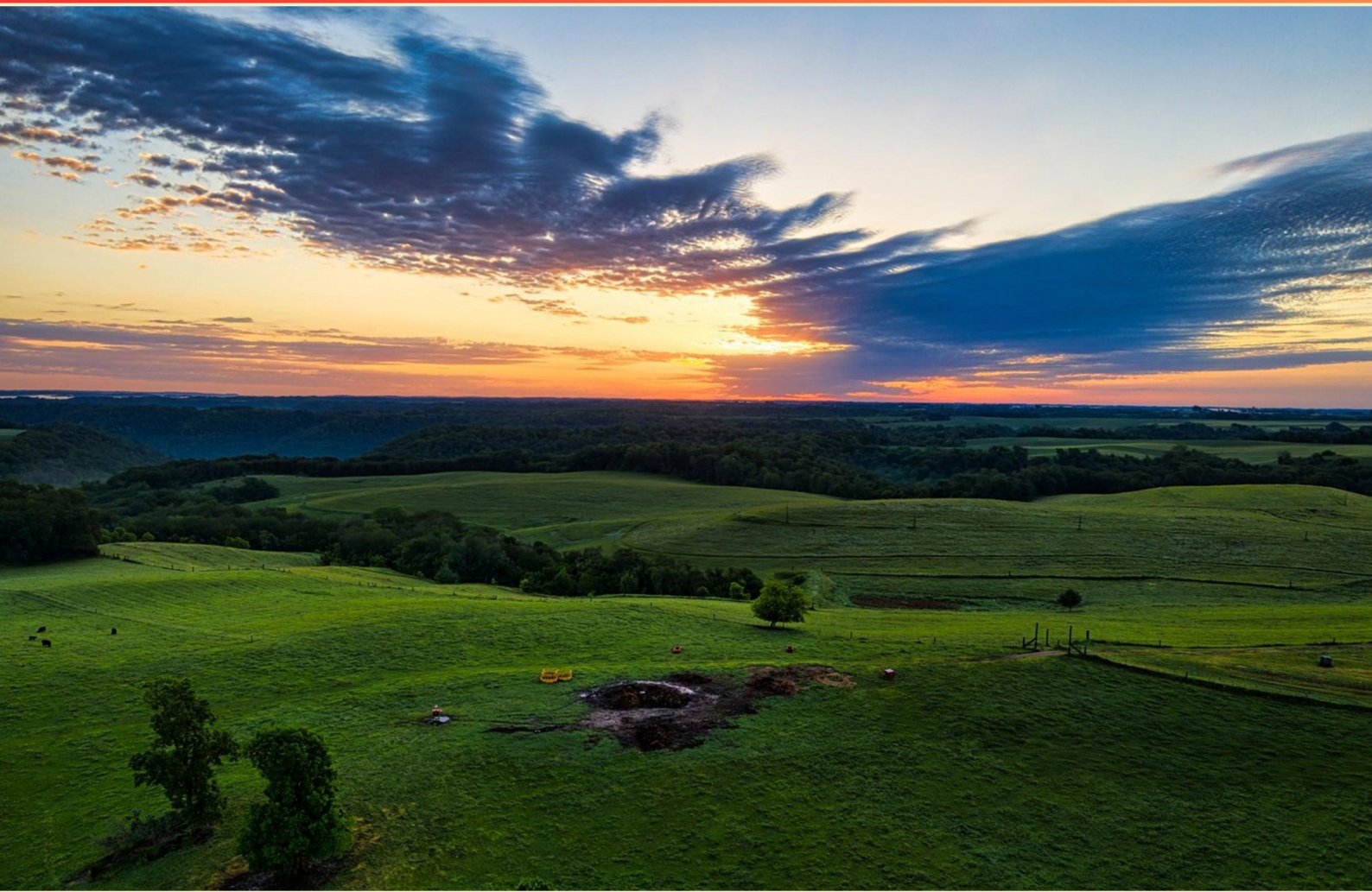

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Explanations

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1. What is the legal blood alcohol content limit for carrying a firearm in Nebraska?
