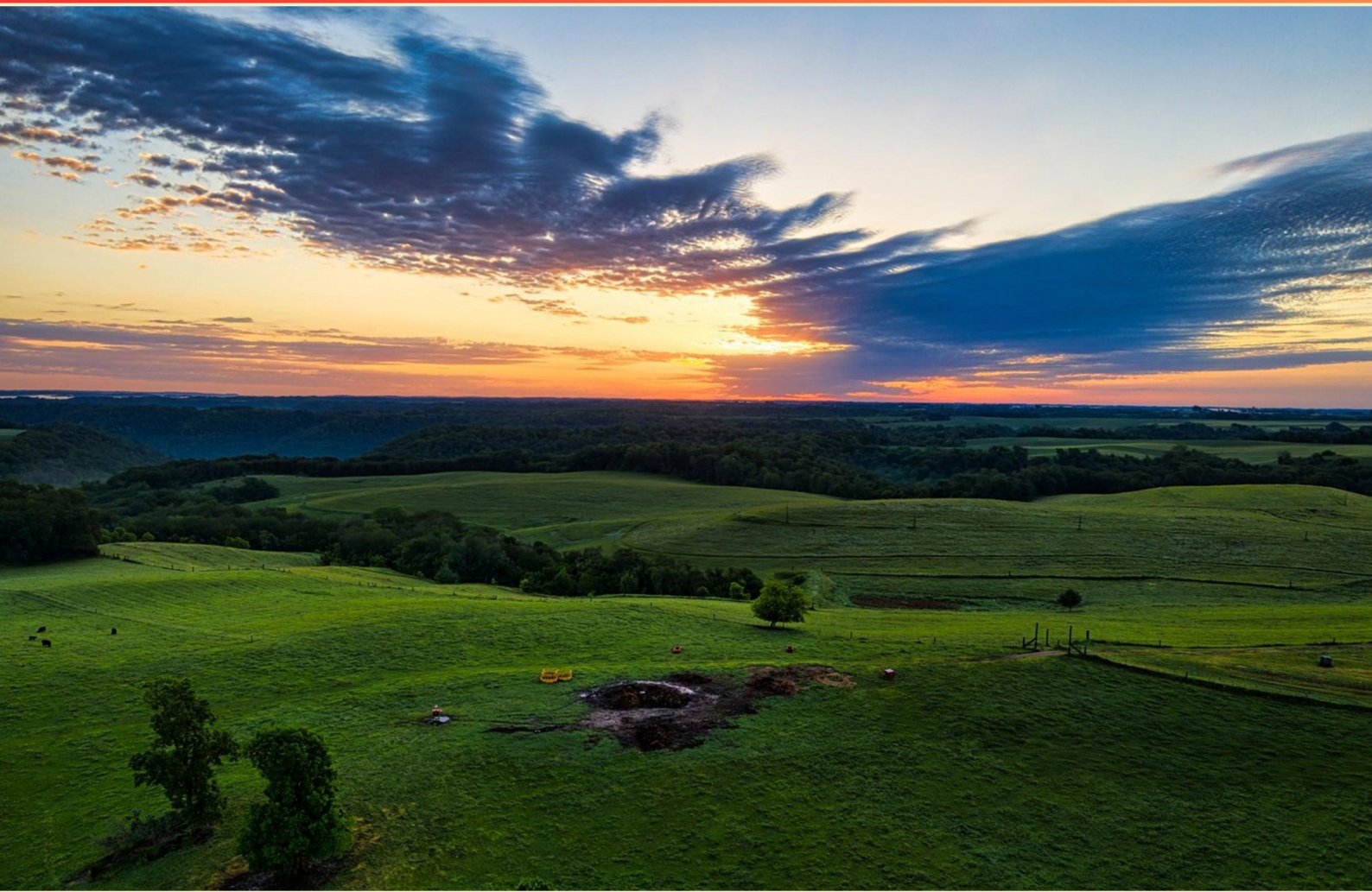

While there may be other safety recommendations for all types of firearms, the specific legal requirement in Nebraska centers on loaded weapons, highlighting the heightened risk they represent. This context reinforces the necessity for responsible firearm ownership, especially in homes with children.
