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## **Explanations**

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**1. Which instruction describes how to assign Page Quality rating to the LP?**

- A. Do not think about the query when assigning Page Quality rating**

The main idea here is that Page Quality rating is based on how good the landing page is on its own, not on what the user searched or asked. When you assign a Page Quality score, you examine the page's content, trustworthiness, transparency, and how well it serves its purpose for any user. That's why you don't factor in the query itself—the rating should be consistent and grounded in the page's own qualities, not in the specific question that led someone there. Thinking about the query could bias the rating toward a particular search intent, which undermines the objectivity of the assessment. Also, details like the color of the page or the length of the user's query have no meaningful bearing on the page's quality or usefulness, so they aren't appropriate bases for the rating. In practical terms, you'd look at whether the page clearly states its purpose, provides accurate and sufficient information, shows expertise and trustworthiness, discloses who created and maintains it, and offers a good, user-friendly experience. Those are the signals that determine Page Quality, independent of the user's query.

Those factors align with a High Met rating because the page meets the main user needs well, though it might not go into every possible detail, offer broad context, or include extra accessibility features that would push it to Fully Met. If the page had inaccuracies, irrelevant content, or unsafe material, the rating would drop; if it fully covered all potential questions with added depth and accessibility, it would be Fully Met.

Fully Meets would require all interpretations to be covered, which isn't the case here. Highly Meets would imply strong alignment across most interpretations, which also isn't true when only one interpretation fits. Not Met would mean none of the interpretations are satisfied, which contradicts the fact that one interpretation is met.

Minor issues, if present, don't affect overall satisfaction for most users. If only some needs are addressed or there are noticeable gaps that prevent many users from being satisfied, that would indicate a partial meet. If the result doesn't satisfy the need well enough to be useful, it isn't sufficient. If it's unclear whether needs are met or results vary in a way that could confuse users, it's ambiguous.

**5. For most queries, which rating is the highest possible rating a result can get?**

So HM is the top, strongest rating available for most results.

Think about what each rating means and how a flag interacts with it. Fully Met means every need is satisfied; Fails Met means the needs aren't met. A flag signals content or safety concerns, but it doesn't automatically decide the rating—it can coexist with different levels of satisfaction depending on which needs are addressed and which are not. In the two scenarios described, the first scenario ends up with everything satisfied (Fully Met) even though there's a porn flag. That shows the flag doesn't by itself prevent a full satisfaction outcome—the needs were completely met despite the flag. The second scenario, however, ends up as a failure to meet needs (FailsMet) even with a porn flag, indicating that the issues flagged or the impact of the flag in that context prevents the needs from being fully satisfied. So the combination that makes sense across the two scenarios is: the first yields a Fully Met rating with a porn flag, and the second yields a Fails Met rating with a porn flag. The other options would imply patterns where the flag changes the overall satisfaction in ways that aren't consistent with how these scenarios are described.

The main idea is matching the level of detail to exactly what the information need requires, without adding extra. The other ratings don't fit as well: Not Met would mean the need isn't addressed at all, while Highly Meets or Fully Meets suggest more extensive coverage or extra details beyond what was requested, which goes beyond the stated need.

When a result is rated Slightly Meets, it means the content only partially satisfies the criteria being looked for. That's why the statement is true: Slightly Meets results may have outdated information. The other options don't fit as well. Saying it's false would ignore the practical link between partial alignment and potential staleness, and "Maybe" or "Unlikely" doesn't capture the reasonable likelihood that incomplete review processes leave room for outdated facts.

Highly Meets results mean the outcome fully satisfies the stated objective with strong, verifiable impact. To judge whether an example fits this level, look for direct alignment with the objective, a substantial and clearly documented improvement, credible evidence (data, metrics, or replication), and signs that the impact is durable rather than a one-off occurrence. If any of these elements are missing, ambiguous, or only show modest effects, the example would not reach the highest tier. In this item, the scenario does not present clear, strong evidence of a high-level impact directly tied to the objective, so it does not meet the standard for Highly Meets. That's why the statement is false. If the results were clearer and more substantial—showing robust, lasting improvement with solid data—the example could be considered Highly Meets.

## 10. A Moderately Meets result can be described as helpful but not fully satisfying.

Interpreting a needs-met rating involves understanding what a given label says about how well a need was addressed. A Moderately Meets result signals that there is noticeable, useful impact, but it does not fully satisfy the need. In other words, the outcome provides some help and makes progress, yet there are still gaps or incomplete fulfillment. That's why describing it as helpful but not fully satisfying is the best fit. If there were no meaningful help, the result would be Not Met; if it fully satisfied the need, it would be Fully Met; and if it was unclear or not applicable to the situation, those labels would apply.
