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Explanations

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1. Which term refers to words that are opposite in meaning?

- A. Synonyms
- B. Antonyms**
- C. Homonyms

Opposite meanings are called antonyms. Recognizing antonyms helps you see how words express contrast, which sharpens understanding of a text. For example, hot and cold show a clear opposite relationship, as do big and small or rise and fall. Other terms refer to different word relationships. Synonyms are words with similar meanings (like happy and glad). Homonyms are words that sound the same but have different meanings (like knight and night). Puns are a form of wordplay that often relies on multiple meanings or sounds of words for humor.

2. Which term designates a genre that blends horror, death, and sometimes romance with fiction?

This item is about naming a genre that blends horror, death, and often romance within fiction. The best term for that blend is Gothic Fiction. It originates from late 18th-century works and is known for moody, atmospheric settings like decaying castles or haunted houses, mysterious or supernatural events, and a strong emotional or romantic undercurrent. These stories trap characters in peril and mystery, heightening fear and desire in tandem. Expressionism is a broader art movement focused on inner emotional experience rather than labeling a specific narrative genre. A novel and a novella describe length or form, not the particular blend of horror and romance, so they don't name the genre on their own.

3. Which metrical foot is described as short-long, da-dum?

In poetry, feet are small units of rhythm that pair syllables in a set pattern. The one described as short-long, or da-dum, is the iamb. It pattern-reads as an unstressed syllable followed by a stressed syllable, like da-DUM when you say it aloud. This rising rhythm feels natural in English and is the backbone of iambic meter, especially in lines that use five iambs per line, known as iambic pentameter. For contrast, other feet mix up the stress order: a trochee is stressed-unstressed (DUM-da), a spondee has two stressed syllables (DUM-DUM), and there are longer feet like anapest (unstressed-unstressed-stressed) and dactyl (stressed-unstressed-unstressed).

*Liberalism in the 19th century centers on protecting individual rights, freedom of thought and speech, and limiting government overreach. John Stuart Mill embodies this blend as a philosopher who also worked within the British civil service. In *On Liberty*, he makes a powerful case for protecting individual liberty, arguing that people should be free to pursue their own good as long as they do not harm others. This is the harm principle, a cornerstone idea that justifies broad freedom of expression because even unpopular opinions can reveal truth and advance society. Mill also pushes for reforms that expand political participation and protect personal autonomy, including early advocacy for gender equality. His practical role in government adds weight to his liberal influence, showing how liberal ideas can shape policy. The other figures are tied to different traditions—Romantic thought, scientific theory, or socialist critique—and are not as centrally associated with advancing liberal political philosophy in the same way. So Mill stands out as the 19th-century English philosopher and civil servant who contributed significantly to liberalism.*

5. Which short narrative song, often sung, tells a simple, sentimental story?

This question assesses recognizing a ballad—the short narrative song that tells a simple, sentimental story. Ballads are traditional songs or poems that recount a straightforward tale, often about love, loss, or danger, in plain language and with a memorable rhythm. They're designed to be sung and frequently include a refrain or repetition that helps listeners remember the story. This makes them distinct from other forms: an epic is a long, sprawling narrative about heroic deeds; a lyric centers on the speaker's feelings and emotions rather than telling a story; a sonnet is a fixed 14-line poem with a specific rhyme and meter.

*This question highlights a novel that centers on wealth, status, and social life on Long Island during the 1920s Jazz Age. *The Great Gatsby* places its story among the upper-class circles of East Egg and West Egg on Long Island, showing Gatsby's mansion, extravagant parties, and the intricate dance of old money versus new money. Through these details—the opulent lifestyle, fashion, social gatherings, and the pursuit (and critique) of the American Dream—the book paints a vivid portrait of that era's elite and their tensions. Other works are set in different times and places: one takes place in early 20th-century Dublin, another in 19th-century American whaling adventures, and another in Napoleonic-era Russia. They explore distinct worlds and themes, so they don't fit the specific Long Island upper-class focus of the Jazz Age as vividly as this novel does.*

7. Which term is a Japanese poem of five unrhymed lines with a 5-7-5-7-7 pattern?

Understanding poetry forms and their structures helps you match descriptions to the right term. A Japanese poem with five lines arranged in a 5-7-5-7-7 syllable pattern fits the traditional form known as a tanka. This form is defined by that exact five-line, 5-7-5-7-7 layout, so it matches the description precisely. Compare this with a haiku, which uses three lines in a 5-7-5 pattern—not five lines. A villanelle is a longer form (19 lines) built from repeating refrains, not defined by a 5-7-5-7-7 syllable scheme. Denouement isn't a poetry form at all; it's a term from narrative structure referring to the ending of a story. So the five-line, 5-7-7-7 pattern described points directly to the tanka.

8. Who authored The Divine Comedy?

The main idea here is identifying who wrote a famous, foundational work. The Divine Comedy was authored by Dante Alighieri, a 14th-century Italian poet. He wrote it in the Italian vernacular, not Latin, and it follows a soul's journey through Hell, Purgatory, and Paradise, which helped establish him as a central figure in Italian literature. Understanding who he is helps distinguish him from other well-known poets. Homer wrote epic tales like The Iliad and The Odyssey in ancient Greek, long before Dante's time. Virgil and Ovid were Roman poets who wrote in Latin—Virgil's Aeneid and Ovid's Metamorphoses are major works in their own right. In the Divine Comedy, Virgil serves as a guide for part of the journey, but he is not the author of this work. Dante's unique choice of language and subject matter is what identifies him as the author.

Understanding how inner thoughts are shared in drama helps identify this device. A soliloquy is a speech given by a character when they are alone on stage, allowing the audience to hear their private thoughts, feelings, and plans as if they were thinking out loud. This moment reveals motives and internal conflicts directly, without other characters present to respond. It's different from exposition, which provides background information to the audience, often through dialogue or narration but not as a private inner monologue. Foreshadowing is about hinting at future events, while suspense is the mood of anticipation and worry about what will happen next. So, the term that describes the thought presented aloud by a character alone is soliloquy. A classic example is Hamlet's famous "To be, or not to be" soliloquy, where he speaks his inner questions aloud while alone on stage.

Deliberate exaggeration for emphasis is the effect of hyperbole. It stretches reality to make something seem much bigger or more dramatic than it actually is, often for humor or emphasis. For instance, "I'm so hungry I could eat a horse" communicates extreme hunger without literal meaning, and "this bag weighs a ton" conveys how heavy something feels. This isn't about figurative phrases in general like idioms, which convey meaning beyond the literal words (for example, "spill the beans" means reveal a secret). It also isn't about pairing opposite terms for a striking effect, as in oxymorons like "jumbo shrimp" or "deafening silence." And it isn't about a quick reference to a well-known person, place, or event, which is allusion. So the device described is hyperbole.
