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Explanations

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1. What procedure should you perform before dry sanitation?

- A. Apply a disinfectant
- B. Clean the surface first**
- C. Rinse with water
- D. Use a steam cleaner

Cleaning the surface first is essential because sanitizers and disinfectants work best on surfaces free of soil, oils, and debris. If dirt and residues remain, they can shield microbes and even neutralize or reduce the effectiveness of the sanitizing agent. So the proper order is to wash with soap and water to remove visible debris, rinse if required, and then apply the sanitizer or disinfectant as directed. This makes the dry sanitation step reliable and effective.

2. Which statement about labeling and expiration of chemical peel products is accurate?

Labeling chemical peel products with an expiration date is a safety and regulatory requirement meant to protect clients and ensure the product works as intended. Peels contain active ingredients whose strength, pH, and formulation potency can change over time. Expired products may be less effective or more irritating, and there's a greater chance of contamination or degraded preservatives once past their shelf life. A clear expiration date on the label helps you confirm the product is still within its safe-and-effective window before use. Relying on brand color is not enough because color can vary between batches and brands, and it does not indicate potency or safety. Saying labeling isn't required or that expiration dates are optional would violate safety standards and professional practice.

Exposure to aniline derivatives in lash tint formulations is described most strongly as a risk to the eyes. These dyes can cause chemical burns if they splash into the eye, and in serious cases can lead to lasting damage or vision loss. Because the eye is highly sensitive, safety guidance emphasizes preventing contact and having a plan if contact occurs (rinse with water immediately and seek medical attention). While irritation can occur, the most common and serious description in safety literature is the potential for serious eye injuries including blindness, which is why protective measures and eye-area precautions are stressed in practice. The other options don't fit because hair growth stimulation is not a recognized risk of these dyes, and stating there are no health risks contradicts known safety concerns.

The agency responsible for the Bloodborne Pathogens Standard in workplace safety is OSHA. This standard is an OSHA regulation that sets enforceable requirements to protect workers who may be exposed to blood or other potentially infectious materials, such as in salons. It covers elements like an exposure control plan, proper personal protective equipment, training, vaccination options, and post-exposure evaluations. Other agencies have related roles but not the enforceable standard itself: the CDC provides guidelines and recommendations, the FDA oversees cosmetics and medical devices, and the EPA regulates disinfectants and environmental hazards.

5. After a facial mask, which products are typically applied to complete the treatment?

After a facial mask, you finish the treatment with products that restore balance, deliver actives, and protect the skin. A toner helps remove any residue, rebalances the skin's pH, and preps the surface for absorption. A serum provides targeted ingredients in a lightweight layer that can penetrate more deeply once the skin is primed. A moisturizer seals in hydration and supports the skin barrier. If you're finishing during the day, applying SPF over the moisturizer adds necessary protection from UV exposure. Cleansers aren't used after the mask, since their job is to cleanse before treatment, and exfoliants are usually not layered on top of a mask because they can irritate the freshly treated skin or are done separately.

Recognizing the most common, least aggressive skin cancer and its typical appearance helps you distinguish it from other lesions. The most common and least aggressive form is basal cell carcinoma, which often shows up as a light-colored, pearly or translucent nodular bump on sun-exposed skin. It tends to grow slowly and rarely spreads beyond the skin, so the prognosis after treatment is usually excellent. You may also notice small visible blood vessels on the surface, and the lesion can crust or ulcerate if irritated. By contrast, squamous cell carcinoma can appear as a rough, scaly patch or a firm, crusted bump with a higher risk of spreading; melanoma arises from pigment-producing cells and can look like an irregular, multi-colored mole with a greater risk of metastasis; dermatofibroma is a benign skin growth and not cancer, and it doesn't behave like a malignant lesion.

7. What is microdermabrasion and how does it exfoliate?

Microdermabrasion is a mechanical, superficial exfoliation method. A handheld device uses either fine crystals or a diamond-tipped wand, along with suction, to physically abrade away a thin layer of dead skin cells on the skin's surface and then lift the debris away. This action smooths the texture of the outermost layer (the stratum corneum) and can improve product absorption and overall brightness. It is distinct from chemical exfoliation, which uses acids like glycolic acid; from laser resurfacing, which uses laser energy to remove skin layers; and from thermal peeling, which relies on heat.

8. What does ATP stand for in cellular energy terms?

ATP is the cellular energy currency: it stores and transfers energy needed for virtually all cellular work. It's made of adenosine attached to three phosphate groups, and the bonds between those phosphates hold a lot of potential energy. When a cell needs energy, a phosphate group is released, converting ATP to ADP (and a free phosphate) and releasing energy to power processes like muscle movement, gland secretion, and the synthesis of biomolecules. Cells continuously regenerate ATP from ADP and phosphate using energy captured from nutrients during cellular respiration (glycolysis, Krebs cycle, and the electron transport chain). Two-phosphate (ADP) and one-phosphate (AMP) forms are lower-energy states, while glucose is a sugar substrate used to generate energy but not the energy-carrying molecule itself. Therefore, the term that best describes the energy carrier in cells is Adenosine Triphosphate.

9. ATP is composed of which three components?

ATP's structure has three parts: the adenosine moiety (adenine attached to a ribose sugar) and a chain of three phosphate groups. The ribose sugar is key—ATP uses ribose, not deoxyribose (which is found in DNA). The three phosphate groups form the triphosphate unit, which is where the high-energy bonds reside. Breaking one of those phosphoester bonds during hydrolysis releases energy that powers cellular work, converting ATP to ADP (and inorganic phosphate) and, with further hydrolysis, to AMP. This combination—adenosine with a ribose and three phosphates—defines ATP's composition.

10. Bacilli are bacteria that are described as which shape?

Bacilli describe bacteria that have a rod-like shape. In microbiology, bacterial shapes are categorized as spherical (cocci), rod-shaped (bacilli), and spiral (spirilla or spirochetes). The plural bacilli refers to many rod-shaped bacteria, which can be straight or slightly curved. So, bar- or rod-shaped is the best description. The spherical form would be cocci, the spiral forms are spirilla or spirochetes, and irregular describes shapes that don't have a uniform rod appearance.
