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1. When should drivers use their headlights according to New Hampshire regulations?

The other options reflect practices that can lead to confusion or unsafe situations. Accelerating before entering the roundabout can disrupt the orderly flow and may lead to collisions. Stopping and waiting for all traffic is also inaccurate, as it can cause unnecessary delays and congestion; the correct action is to yield instead of stopping completely. Using only the left lane may not be appropriate, as roundabouts typically allow for multiple lanes, and drivers should choose their lane based on their intended exit rather than restricting themselves to the left lane.

It is also worth noting that the consequences of refusal are separate from any additional penalties that might apply if a driver is convicted of an alcohol or drug offense after taking a test. The longer suspension period conveys the seriousness with which the state regards such refusals and reinforces the importance of cooperating with law enforcement.

Once you reach the next exit, you can follow the signs to return to your desired route or use a GPS to find the best way back.
