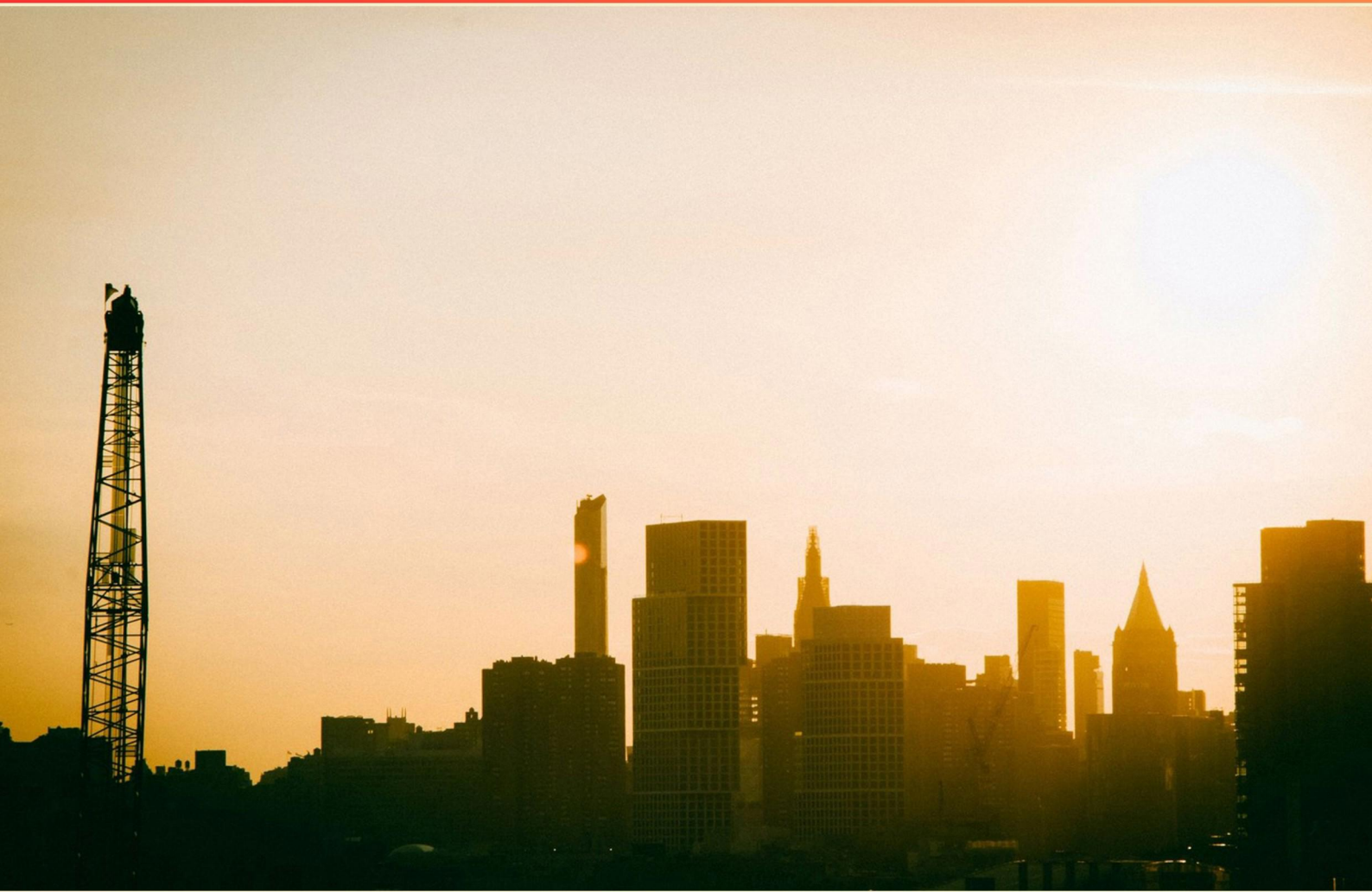

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1. Which term refers to the measure of acidity or alkalinity of a substance?
