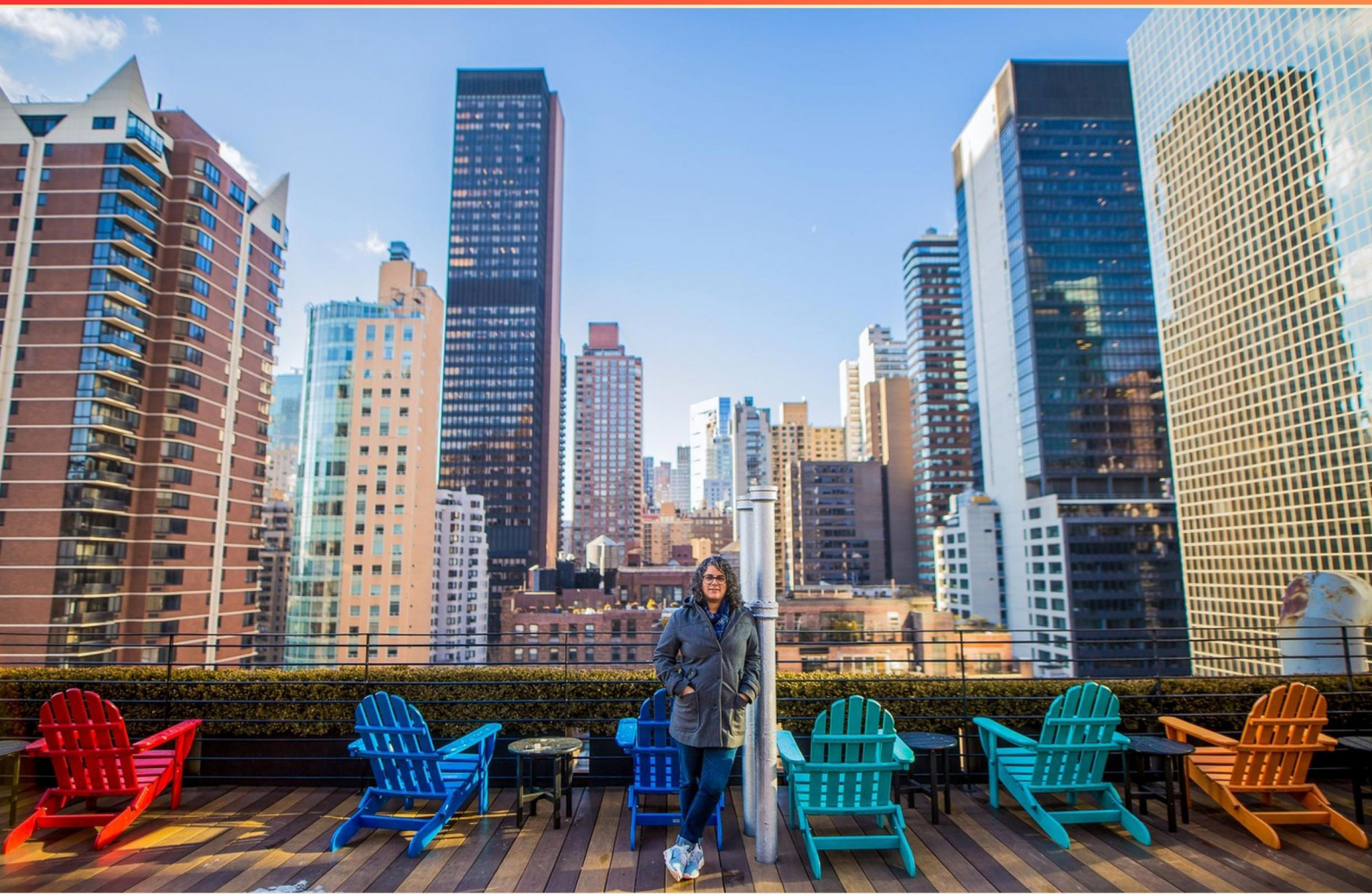

SAMPLE

1. For a recently transplanted small deciduous tree showing wilting, which action is least desirable?

- A. Water immediately
- B. Mulch around base
- C. Provide shade

The situation centers on reducing transplant shock and supporting the newly transplanted root system. When a recently moved, small deciduous tree wilts, the priority is to help the roots take up water and stay cool, not to disturb the root ball further or drown the roots. Watering immediately helps relieve drought stress and gets moisture to the recently unsettled roots. Mulching around the base conserves soil moisture, buffers temperature swings, and reduces evaporation, giving the tree a better chance to recover. Providing temporary shade lowers water loss through transpiration and shields the tender leaves from heat stress as the roots re-establish. Removing the tree from the pot and submerging the roots is least desirable because it further disturbs the delicate root system, exposes roots to air and temperature fluctuations, and can create a waterlogged environment that deprives roots of oxygen and promotes rot. This action compounds transplant shock instead of alleviating it.

The main idea here is the climbing habit. Clematis, wisteria, and ampelopsis are all grown for their ability to ascend vertical supports like trellises, walls, or arbors, making them ornamental climbing plants. They climb using twining stems, tendrils, or other means to grip supports, providing vertical interest in a garden. Ground covers stay on the ground and spread across the soil, so that doesn't fit. Some of these vines are woody (like wisteria and ampelopsis), while Clematis can be herbaceous or woody, so labeling them as herbaceous perennials isn't accurate for all of them. They aren't succulents, which are typically small, fleshy-celled plants adapted to store water. So the best fit is ornamental climbing plants due to their distinctive climbing growth form and use in vertical spaces.

Monocotyledons are classified by having a single seed leaf, called a cotyledon, in the seed. This single cotyledon is the first leaf that appears as the seed germinates, and it distinguishes monocots from dicotyledons, which have two seed leaves. Beyond this defining feature, monocots often show parallel leaf venation and vascular bundles scattered in the stem, but those traits are additional characteristics, not the defining criterion. Examples of monocots include grasses, corn, and lilies. So the defining feature is one seed leaf.

4. Red Fescue is best suited for which conditions?

Red fescue is a fine-leaved cool-season grass that handles a range of light conditions and isn't tied to wet soils. Its ability to persist in drier soils comes from its root system and growth habit, which conserve moisture, making it well suited for sites that aren't constantly moist. It also tolerates both full sun and light shade, so it stays green in varied light levels. Wet, poorly drained clay offers poor aeration and invites problems that red fescue doesn't tolerate well. Sites that are deeply shaded limit photosynthesis, and while red fescue can handle shade, it isn't limited to deep shade alone. Acidic peat beds tend to be very wet and highly acidic, which isn't ideal for this grass that prefers well-drained conditions. For these reasons, the best match is dry soil with sun or shade.

Acer platanoides is a maple. The genus Acer includes maples, and platanoides identifies this specific species within that group, commonly known as the Norway maple. Maples are known for their characteristic lobed leaves and paired winged seeds, and Acer platanoides is a widespread urban maple tree. The other trees belong to different genera—oak, pine, and cedar—so their scientific names would be Quercus, Pinus, or Cedrus, not Acer platanoides.

6. Most plants begin to suffer heat damage at approximately:

Most garden plants start to show heat stress when leaf temperatures reach the mid-80s Fahrenheit. About 86°F is the point where enzymatic activity and membrane stability begin to be challenged, so photosynthesis slows while respiration continues, leading to symptoms like wilting, leaf scorch, and stunted growth. That's why 86°F is the best general estimate for when heat damage begins for many common plants. Lower temperatures like 72°F or 60°F are well within comfortable ranges for growth, while 100°F represents an extreme level of heat where severe damage is more likely, not the typical onset for most plants.

7. If new turf grass is dying around the edges, what should you brush into the joints between the sods?

When turf is laid, the goal is to have each sod piece sit firmly on soil with no air pockets at the seams. If the edges are dying, it's usually because there are gaps or poor contact between pieces, which dries out and slows root establishment. Brushing water into the joints helps by settling the soil and pushing the sod edges tight against one another, eliminating those air pockets. The moisture promotes root contact with the soil beneath and encourages quick rooting along the seams. Adding a dressing of sandy loam would create uneven surfaces and drainage issues, mulch between sods isn't appropriate, and fertilizer in the joints isn't needed for establishing new sod and could harm tender roots. Water directly into the joints is the effective choice here.

8. What is the neutral pH level?

pH describes how acidic or basic a solution is by looking at hydrogen ion concentration. A neutral solution has equal amounts of H^+ and OH^- , which places pH at 7 on the standard scale. The scale runs from 0 to 14: numbers below 7 are acidic (more H^+), numbers above 7 are basic (more OH^-). So 7 is the neutral point, while 0 is extremely acidic, 14 is highly basic, and 5 is acidic. At room temperature, $[H^+]$ and $[OH^-]$ are both 1×10^{-7} M in a neutral solution, giving pH = 7.

Safety rules should be discussed first when a new laborer reports for duty. Establishing safety expectations sets the foundation for every task on the site, helping prevent injuries and ensuring compliance with regulations. Cover why PPE is needed, how to handle and store tools and equipment, basic worker and bystander awareness, and what to do in an emergency or if something goes wrong. When a new worker understands the safety framework from day one, they can perform tasks with the right precautions and know whom to report hazards to. Once this safety baseline is clear, you can address other topics like dress code, shift schedules, or new techniques, but those won't be as effective if safety basics aren't understood first.

Cold frames trap solar heat to create a warmer microclimate for plants. This makes them ideal for season extension, letting you start seeds earlier in spring and protect transplants from late frosts so you can harvest later into fall. The heat comes from sunlight that warms the soil and air inside, with the transparent cover helping hold that heat during cooler periods. Manage them by venting on warm days to prevent overheating and to keep air circulation healthy. They aren't primarily about supplying water, decomposing material, or trimming plants, which is why irrigation, composting, and pruning aren't the main purpose.
